Executive Summary

About the Survey

Dakota County contracted with National Research Center, Inc. to develop and administer a single-topic survey to residents titled the "Dakota County 2015 Park Visitor Survey". Dakota County wished to capture community input on priorities for County parks and regional trails through a community-wide scientific survey. The survey gauged resident current use, and likelihood of future use, of park and recreation opportunities and satisfaction with facilities and programs.

The survey was mailed to 5,000 randomly selected households in Dakota County in October 2015. Recipients completed a total of 896 surveys, providing an 18% response rate and a margin of error of plus or minus three percentage points. The survey results reported here were weighted to reflect the demographic profile of all Dakota County residents.

KEY FINDINGS

Dakota County residents are aware of Dakota County parks that are close to them and think highly of Dakota County Parks and Regional Trails.

- When asked to indicate how Dakota County parks and regional trails compare to other parks they visit, about 9 in 10 gave excellent or good ratings and no one gave a poor rating.
- Three-quarters of survey respondents indicated they were able to name the Dakota County Park closest to them prior to reading the survey materials.

Most residents prioritize outdoor recreation and value benefits of parks and trails.

- When thinking about other ways they spend free time, more than 8 in 10 residents indicated that outdoor recreation was at least a medium-level priority to them; of those, half indicated that outdoor recreation was a high priority.
- Nearly all survey respondents strongly or somewhat agreed that benefits of parks and trails include that they improve physical or mental health and fitness; protect natural resources and water quality; improve quality of life in the county; create places for scenic landscape views, and preserve large areas of open space. About 9 in 10 agreed that parks and trails increase property values while 8 in 10 agreed they provide opportunities for people to be with other people and cultures. Only eight percent of survey respondents said they don't see any benefit from parks/trails to themselves or their household.

Survey participants said they visit Dakota County parks or trails because they enjoy out-of-doors natural settings while about half agree they do not visit because they are too busy.

- At least 9 in 10 residents somewhat or strongly agreed that the reasons they visit parks or trails are because they enjoy out-of-doors natural settings and that they feel safe in the parks or on the trails; slightly fewer (87%) agreed they like exploring places that are new to them and they enjoy the activities at the parks and trails. About two-thirds agreed that the parks are places they go for solitude and privacy and only one-third indicated agreement that they rarely visit Dakota County parks or trails.
- About half of survey respondents somewhat or strongly agreed that they do not visit parks or trails because they're too busy and do other things with their leisure time. About one-third indicated they are not familiar with Dakota County parks/trails and one-fifth or fewer strongly or somewhat agreed with the remaining nine potential reasons (don't have a way to get there, no interest, etc.).

Residents were most likely to use benches and scenic overlooks along trails, rent several types of recreational equipment, and attend events related to music, concerts and performances. Residents were least likely to rent adaptive recreation equipment and purchase souvenirs.

- Survey respondents were given an extensive list of services, programs, park amenities and rental options, and were asked to indicate how likely they would be to use each in the next two years.
 - Recreation equipment for rental: When asked about recreational equipment rentals, over half of residents indicated they would be somewhat or very likely to rent canoes or kayaks in the next two years. Just under half indicated they would be somewhat or very likely to rent paddleboats (47%), paddleboards (47%), snowshoes (46%) and bicycles (46%). At the bottom of the list (with 20% or fewer indicating they would be somewhat or very likely to rent these items) were headlamps, kicksleds and adaptive recreation equipment.
 - <u>Food services:</u> Between 46% and 53% of survey respondents indicated they would be somewhat or very likely to use each of the four listed food services within the next two years.
 - <u>Amenities</u>: About three-quarters of residents would be somewhat or very likely to use benches and scenic overlooks along trails while two-thirds would be likely to use improved park trail signs for way-finding. Only one-quarter would be likely to purchase souvenirs.
 - <u>Programs</u>: Just over half of residents would be very or somewhat likely to use or participate in fitness/wellness programs for adults or a system of self-guided technology to learn about the park or the natural world. About 3 in 10 would be likely to use or participate in travel programs and programs with pets.
 - Attending events: About 7 in 10 residents would be somewhat or very likely to attend events related to music, concerts or performances and 6 in 10 would be likely to attend evening showings of movies in parks. Between 43% and 49% would be likely to attend the other listed events.
 - Renting park facilities: About 4 in 10 residents would be somewhat or very likely to rent a picnic shelter for a gathering of 100 people or fewer while 3 in 10 would be likely to rent a smaller retreat center or lodge for a family, corporate or organization event of fewer than 50 people. About 2 in 10 would be likely to rent a visitor center for a family, corporate or organization event for 50 to 200 people or rent a picnic shelter for a gathering of more than 100 people.

Residents feel it is important to add recreational opportunities and provide nature-based/environmental programs.

- Survey respondents were asked to indicate how important they believe a variety of actions are to
 improve services for Dakota County Parks' visitors. About half of residents indicated that adding
 recreational opportunities at more of the existing regional parks was an essential or very important
 action to improve services. Slightly fewer believed adding more environmental education programs
 and adding more recreational skill-based programs were essential or very important.
- Residents were asked to rate how important it was to provide three types of programs to specific audiences (nature-based/environmental programs, skill-based outdoor recreation programs and arts, culture and history programs). Ratings for nature-based/environmental programs tended to be highest across the specific listed audiences ranging from preschool-aged children to older adults and people with disabilities. The exception to this is the importance rating for skill-based outdoor recreation programs, which was highest for teenagers and young adults. Importance ratings were

the same for adults (25-49) for nature-based/environmental programs and skill-based outdoor recreation programs.

Less than a majority of residents supported each method of funding listed for improving existing visitor services or programs, but few indicated they would not support increased spending to improve parks.

- The funding methods with the most support were raising fees on existing uses with permits and making parks a higher priority in the overall County budget with about one-third of residents indicating that they would support each.
- The lowest degree of support for any method of raising revenue for County parks was charging admission fees (7%); more than twice as many residents supported increasing property taxes to provide more services in parks (17%).
- About one-fifth or fewer residents would support charging fees for more park activities that are currently free, charging admission fees at all parks, and increasing property taxes.
- Twelve percent of residents indicated they would not support increased spending to improve services in the parks and 18% indicated they didn't know.

Previous research (not conducted by NRC), identified population subgroups that are under-represented among park visitors: those who are low-income, seniors, and members of communities of color or immigrants. Using demographic information provided by those who responded to the survey, data analysis tested for differences in responses among those demographic groups (see *Appendix C: Responses to Selected Questions by Respondent Characteristics*). Where statistically valid differences exist among demographic groups, they are noted in the *Report of Results* section starting on page 5.

Survey Background

Survey Purpose

Dakota County contracted with National Research Center, Inc. to develop and administer a single-topic survey to residents titled the "Dakota County 2015 Park Visitor Survey". Dakota County wished to capture community input on priorities for County parks and regional trails through a community-wide scientific survey. The survey gauged resident current use, and likelihood of future use, of park and recreation opportunities and satisfaction with facilities and programs.

The survey was mailed to 5,000 randomly selected residential addresses within Dakota County. Of these, 4,879 were delivered to occupied households. Approximately 121 postcards were undeliverable because the housing unit was vacant or the postal service was unable to deliver it as addressed. A total of 896 completed surveys were received, for a response rate of 18%. Surveys were color coded in order to track responses from 12 municipal locations within the County (please see *Appendix F: Survey Methodology* for more information on the 12 municipal locations).

Survey results were weighted so that respondent age, gender, race, ethnicity, housing unit type, housing tenure and geographic location were represented in the proportions reflective of the Dakota County adult population. (For more information on the survey methodology and weighting, see Appendix F: Survey Methodology.) It is customary to describe the precision of estimates made from surveys by a "level of confidence" (or margin of error). The 95% confidence level for this survey is generally no greater than plus or minus three percentage points around any given percent reported for all survey respondents (896 completed surveys).

How the Results are Reported

The body of the report includes graphs and tables of summarized results, while full results for each question appear in *Appendix B: Complete Survey Responses*. Often, in the body of the report, the responses to only one or two of the response categories are shown; for example, the proportion rating an item as "excellent" or "good." For the most part, "don't know" responses are excluded from the executive summary, report body and cross-tabulations but appear in the full results in the appendix. In other words, the results in most of the report are based on respondents with an opinion about an item.

When a table for a question that only permitted a single response does not total to exactly 100%, it is due to percentages being rounded to the nearest whole number.

Comparing Survey Results by Respondent Characteristics

Selected survey results were compared by respondent characteristics and are presented in *Appendix C:* Responses to Selected Questions by Respondent Characteristics. When commentary surrounding the comparisons is presented in the report body, only those differences that were statistically significant are included in the commentary.

Report of Results


The Dakota County 2015 Park Visitor Survey included questions about setting priorities for outdoor recreation, residents' use and likelihood of future use of park recreation opportunities and satisfaction with facilities and programs, along with their preferences for funding existing or new visitor services or programs at County parks.

Overall Prioritization of Outdoor Recreation

More than 8 in 10 residents indicated that outdoor recreation was at least a medium priority to them; of those, half indicated that outdoor recreation was a high priority.

The survey results were compared by respondent demographic subgroups and various statistically significant differences across the subgroups emerged. Residents who were female, who had a household income less than\$50,000 or were 55 years or older tended to give lower prioritization ratings to outdoor recreation compared to other survey respondents. Residents with a lower level of education also tended to give lower prioritization ratings to outdoor recreation compared to residents who had earned a Bachelor's, graduate or professional degree. Figure 1: Overall Prioritization of Outdoor Recreation




Comparative Quality of Dakota County Parks and Regional Trails

When asked to indicate how Dakota County parks and regional trails compare to other parks they visit, about 9 in 10 gave excellent or good ratings and no one gave a poor rating.

When ratings were compared by respondent demographic subgroups, residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color¹ tended to rate the comparative quality of Dakota County parks lower than other survey respondents. Statistically significant differences did not emerge across subgroups of length of residency, household income, education, age or gender. 

First they were asked to indicate if they were Spanish, Hispanic, or Latino and then they were asked to indicate which race(s) they identified with from the following list: American Indian or Alaskan Native; Asian, Asian Indian or Pacific Islander; Black or African American; White; or Other. Familiarity with Dakota County Parks

Three-quarters of survey respondents indicated they were able to name the Dakota County park closest to them prior to reading the survey.

Residents who had lived in Dakota County for less than five years, who had a household income of less than \$50,000 and whose education level was some high school or a high school graduate tended to be less familiar with the Dakota County park closest to them compared to other survey respondents. Residents aged 18 to 34 and 55 years or older tended to be less familiar with the park closest to them compared to residents aged 35 to 54. Figure 3: Familiarity with Dakota County Park Locations




Park Visitation

About three-quarters of survey respondents visit County parks within Dakota County at least once a month or less and about 3 in 10 visit Dakota County parks two to four times a month or more frequently. About 7 in 10 residents visit parks that are outside of Dakota County at least once a month or less but only 16% indicated they visit these parks two or more times a month. About 6 in 10 residents visit City parks within Dakota County and Dakota County's paved recreational trails and between 25% and 30% visit these parks or recreational trails two to four times a month or more frequently.

When ratings were compared by respondent demographic subgroups, various statistically significant differences emerged. Residents aged 55 years or older with a household income of less than \$50,000 and those with a lower level of education (some high school or high school graduate) were less likely to visit each of the parks or regional trails listed in this question compared to other survey respondents. Residents who identified as White alone, not Hispanic were less likely than other survey respondents to visit Dakota County's paved recreational trails outside County parks. Individual Park Visitation

In a separate survey in 2014, Dakota County residents were given the opportunity to indicate how often, if ever, in the last 12 months they visited a list of specific parks. Slightly less than half of respondents had visited Lebanon Hills Regional Park at least once in the 12 months prior to the survey. This was the most popular of the County's parks. About one in five respondents had visited Spring Lake Park Reserve, Big Rivers Regional Trail or Mississippi River Regional Trail at least once. Other parks in the County (e.g., Whitetail Woods Regional Park, Miesville Ravine Park Reserve and Dakota Woods Off-Leash Dog Park) had not been visited by the majority of respondents.


Outside of Dakota County, Como Park in St. Paul and Minnehaha Park in Minneapolis were among the more popular regional or state parks; about half of respondents had visited these parks at least once. About one-third had visited other parks in Minneapolis (e.g., Nokomis-Hiawatha Park, Chain of Lakes Park and Fort Snelling State Park), while parks in St. Paul, Scott County, Washington County and elsewhere tended not to be frequented by Dakota County residents. Reasons for Not Visiting

Residents were asked to review a list of potential reasons for not visiting County parks or trails and then indicate if they agreed or disagreed that these reasons were keeping them from visiting County parks or trails. Half of survey respondents somewhat or strongly agreed that they're too busy and do other things with their leisure time. About one-third indicated they are not familiar with Dakota County parks/trails and one-fifth or fewer strongly or somewhat agreed with the remaining nine potential reasons.

Generally, residents with a household income of \$50,000 to \$100,000 or higher and those with a higher education level (Associate or technical school degree) were less likely to agree with the listed reasons for not visiting County parks compared to other survey respondents. Residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color were more likely to agree that they prefer to visit other parks instead of Dakota County parks or trails and that Dakota County parks don't offer the activities they want to do while residents who identified as White alone, not Hispanic were more likely to agree that they're too busy and do other things with their leisure time, are not familiar with the County parks/trails and don't have anyone to go with them. 

After indicating reasons for not visiting County parks or trails, residents were asked to review a list of potential reasons to visit County parks or trails. Then they were asked to indicate if they agree or disagree that these are reasons they visit County parks or trails. At least 9 in 10 residents somewhat or strongly agreed that the reasons they visit parks or trails are because they enjoy out-of-doors natural settings and they feel safe in the parks or on the trails, while slightly fewer (87%) agreed they like exploring places that are new to them and they enjoy the activities at the parks and trails. About two-thirds agreed that the parks are places they go for solitude and privacy and only one-third indicated agreement that they rarely visit Dakota County parks or trails.

Generally, residents with a household income of \$50,000 to \$100,000 or higher were more likely to agree with the listed reasons for visiting County parks compared to other survey respondents, although residents with a household income of \$100,000 or more were less likely to agree that the parks are places they go for solitude and privacy. Residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color were more likely to agree that the parks are familiar to them but less likely to agree that they feel safe in the parks or on trails and that they enjoy out-of-doors natural settings compared to other survey respondents. Residents 55 years or older were less likely to agree that they spend time with their friends, family or pets in parks or on trails and were more likely to agree that they rarely visit Dakota County parks or trails. 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
Benefits of Parks

Residents were asked a question about the benefits of parks visitation in an effort to learn whether or not people who do not go to parks or trails still found value in them, and if so, what kind of value. Almost all survey respondents strongly or somewhat agreed that benefits of parks and trails include that they improve physical or mental health and fitness; protect natural resources and water quality; improve quality of life in the county; create places for scenic landscape views and preserve large areas of open space. About 9 in 10 agreed that parks and trails increase property values while 8 in 10 agreed they provide opportunities for people to be with other people and cultures. Only eight percent agreed that they don't see any benefit to them or their household.

When ratings were compared by respondent demographic subgroups, various statistically significant differences emerged. Generally, residents who identified as White alone, not Hispanic and were ages 18 to 34 tended to agree that the statements listed in this question were benefits compared to other survey respondents. Residents with a household income of less than \$50,000 were more likely to agree that parks and trails provide opportunities for people to be with other people and cultures compared to residents with higher household incomes. Residents 55 years or older were more likely to agree that they don't see any benefits for them or their household. Residents who indicated they do not see any benefit for them or their household were also more likely than other survey respondents to indicate that outdoor recreation was a low priority for them compared to other ways they spend their free time (please see Figure 1 on page 5).


Likelihood of Volunteerism

Survey respondents were given a list of seven volunteer opportunities and were asked to indicate how likely they would be, if at all, to participate in those activities within the next year. About half of respondents would be somewhat or very likely to participate in park or trail clean-up events and about 4 in 10 would be likely to participate in cleaning up shores of streams/lakes. About one-third would be likely to participate in restoring native prairies, assisting with special events in the parks and removing invasive species. Between 21% and 27% would be somewhat or very likely to assist with classes or lessons and participate in trail patrol.

For each of the volunteer opportunities listed, residents who were 55 years or older were less likely to participate compared to younger residents. Residents with a lower education level (some high school or high school graduate) were less likely to participate in park or trail clean-up events compared to residents with a higher education level. Residents who were newer to the community (less than five years), and those who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color, were generally more likely to volunteer for the listed opportunities compared to residents who had lived in the community longer and who identified as White alone (not Hispanic). Figure 8: Likelihood of Volunteerism


Please indicate how likely, if at all, you or members of your household would be to participate in each of these volunteer opportunities at a Dakota County park in the next year:



When asked to indicate how much time, if at all, they'd be willing to spend as a volunteer, about half of residents indicated a few hours three to four times a year or less, while one-fifth indicated they were not interested in any volunteer activities. About one-fifth would be willing to volunteer at least one day each month.

Residents who had lived in the community for more than 20 years and who were 55 years or older were more likely to indicate that they were not interested in any volunteer opportunities compared to other survey respondents. Residents with a lower education level (some high school or high school graduate) were more likely to indicate that they were not interested in any volunteer opportunities compared to residents with a higher education level. Residents with a household income of \$100,000 or more were more likely to volunteer one day or less per year while residents with a household income of \$50,000 or less were more likely to volunteer about one half-day each month. 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Likelihood of Future Program or Service Use

Survey respondents were given an extensive list of services, programs, park amenities and potential rentals, and asked to indicate how likely, if at all, they would be to use each in the next two years. The items listed were grouped into categories on the survey, and are reported in those same categories in this report.


Availability of Recreation Equipment for Rental

When asked about recreational equipment rentals, over half of residents indicated they would be somewhat or very likely to rent canoes or kayaks in the next two years (please see Figure 10 on the following page). Just under half indicated they would be somewhat or very likely to rent paddleboats (47%), paddleboards (47%), snowshoes (46%) and bicycles (46%). At the bottom of the list with 20% or fewer indicating they would be somewhat or very likely to rent these items were headlamps, kicksleds and adaptive recreation equipment.

When ratings were compared by respondent demographic subgroups, various statistically significant differences emerged. Generally, residents who had lived in the community for more than 20 years and were 55 years or older tended to be less likely to rent recreation equipment compared to those who had lived in the community for less than five years and were aged 18 to 54. Among the statistically significant differences across the subgroup of race and ethnicity, residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color tended to be more likely to rent rowboats, bicycles, fishing gear, kicksleds, camping gear and adaptive recreation equipment compared to other survey respondents. When considering the list of parks services or programs below, how likely would you be, if at all, to use each of the following in the next two years?




Availability of Food Services

Between 46% and 53% of survey respondents indicated they would be somewhat or very likely to use each of the four listed food services within the next two years. No more than 20% indicated that they would be very likely to use any of the food service options.

Residents who had lived in the community for 6 to 20 years tended to be more likely to use food services compared to residents who had lived in the community for a shorter or longer period of time. Residents with a household income of less than \$50,000 tended to be more likely to use a Café/restaurant compared to residents with a higher household income. Residents with an Associate or technical school degree or higher level of education tended to be more likely to use food trucks compared to other survey respondents. For each of the four food services choices, residents who were aged 18 to 54 were more likely to use the services compared to older residents. Figure 11: Availability of Food Services




Adding Amenities

About three-quarters of residents would be somewhat or very likely to use benches and scenic overlooks along trails while two-thirds would be likely to use improved park trail signs for way-finding. About 6 in 10 would be likely to use an amphitheater and half would be likely to use gardens such as native plants, community food plots, or ornamental gardens. Only one-quarter would be likely to purchase souvenirs.

Where differences emerged, residents aged 18 to 54 and those who were women tended to be more likely to use the listed amenities compared to older residents and men. Residents with a higher education level (Bachelor's, graduate or professional degree) were more likely to use improved park trail signs for way-finding and benches and scenic overlooks along trails but less likely to purchase convenience items and souvenirs compared to other survey respondents. Figure 12: Adding Amenities




Adding Programs

Just over half of residents would be very or somewhat likely to use or participate in fitness/wellness programs for adults and a system of self-guided technology to learn about the park or the natural world. About 4 in 10 would be likely to use or participate in summer camp programs for children, fitness/wellness programs for children and birthday parties. About 3 in 10 would be likely to use or participate in travel programs and programs with pets.

Where differences emerged, residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color were more likely to use the listed programs compared to residents who identified as White alone, not Hispanic. Residents aged 18 to 54 tended to be more likely to use the listed programs compared to older residents but younger residents (18 to 34) and older residents (55 or older) were less likely than residents age 35 to 54 to use or participate in travel programs. Figure 13: Adding Programs




Attending an Event

About 7 in 10 residents would be somewhat or very likely to attend events related to music, concerts or performances and 6 in 10 would be likely to attend evening showings of movies in parks. Between 43% and 49% would be likely to attend the other listed events.

Residents who had lived in the community for less than five years and were aged 18 to 54 were more likely to indicate they'd attend each of the events listed compared to other survey respondents. Residents with a higher education level (Bachelor's, graduate or professional degree) were more likely than other survey respondents to attend recreation activity events. Residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color were more likely to attend visual and public arts events and multicultural celebrations compared to residents who identified as White alone, not Hispanic. Figure 14: Attending an Event




Renting Park Facilities for a Private Event

About 4 in 10 residents would be somewhat or very likely to rent a picnic shelter for a gathering of 100 people or fewer while 3 in 10 would be likely to rent a smaller retreat center or lodge for a family, corporate or organization event of fewer than 50 people. About 2 in 10 would be likely to rent a visitor center for a family, corporate or organization event for 50 to 200 people or rent a picnic shelter for a gathering of more than 100 people.


Residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color were more likely to rent each of the listed park facilities compared to residents who identified as White alone, not Hispanic. Residents with a lower education level (some high school or high school graduate) were more likely than other survey respondents to rent a picnic shelter for a gathering of more than 100 people or rent a smaller retreat center or lodge for a family, corporate or organization event of fewer than 50 people. 

Other Activities, Programs and Rentals

Survey respondents were given an opportunity to write-in an "other" item after reviewing the extensive list of services, programs, park amenities and potential rentals. Of the 896 survey respondents, 146 opted to write-in a response (slightly more than 16%). The written-in responses were reviewed and grouped into thematic categories. About 14% of those who wrote in a response had comments related to trails. Fewer than 1 in 10 wrote-in comments related to each of the remaining listed categories. Many responses were too varied to create a meaningful theme or category, and these responses were grouped into "other."

Importance of Activities

In a separate survey in 2014, Dakota County residents were given the opportunity to review a less complete list of activities and were asked to indicate how important, if at all, each type of activity was for them to do in regional parks. About 7 in 10 respondents felt it was essential or very important to be able to enjoy nature or scenic views in regional parks. Other important activities (rated essential or very important by about 4 in 10 respondents) included hiking or running on paved trails, picnicking, bicycling on paved trails and playground use.

Community gardening, camping (in camper cabins and RV/trailer), cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, mountain biking, archery and horseback riding were activities viewed as not important at all to a majority of respondents in the 2014 survey. 
Importance of Service or Program Improvements

Survey respondents were asked to indicate how important they believe a variety of actions are to improve services for Dakota County Parks visitors. About half of residents indicated that additional recreational opportunities at more of the existing regional parks were an essential or very important action to improve services. Slightly fewer believed adding more environmental education programs and adding more recreational skill-based programs were essential or very important. About one-third believed providing more space for social activities and increasing opportunities for cultural education programs were essential or very important actions to improve services.

Residents with higher education levels (Associate or technical school degree or higher) were more likely to place importance on adding recreational opportunities at more of the existing regional parks and adding more recreation skill-based programs but were less likely to place importance on adding more environmental education programs, increasing opportunities for cultural education programs and providing more space for social activities. Residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color were more likely to place importance on adding more recreation skill-based programs compared to residents who identified as White alone, not Hispanic. As Dakota County considers options to improve services for Dakota County Parks visitors, please rate how important, if at all, each of the following actions are to you:




Programs for Specific Audiences

When asked about the importance of offering nature-based/environmental programs for specific audiences, essential or very important ratings ranged from 53% to 69%. At the top of the list with 69% of residents giving essential or very important ratings was children (ages 5-12) followed closely by organized school field trips (68%) and families (66%). At the bottom of the list were preschool aged children with 54% essential or very important followed by adults (53%).

When ratings were compared by respondent demographic subgroups, various statistically significant differences emerged. Generally, residents who had lived in the community for more than 20 years, were aged 55 or older and who were male tended to be less likely to place importance on providing these programs to all listed audiences compared to other survey respondents. As income levels increased, ratings of importance for programs across the various audiences decreased. (Please see Appendix C: Responses to Selected Questions by Respondent Characteristics for more information and additional comparisons.)

Please indicate how important, if at all, you feel it is for Dakota County to offer various types of programs (such as classes or lessons) to the specific audiences listed below.




When asked about the importance of offering skill-based outdoor recreation programs for the same listed audiences, essential or very important ratings ranged from 36% to 61%. At the top of the list with 61% of residents giving essential or very important ratings were teenagers and young adults followed closely by children ages 5-12 (60%) and families (57%). At the bottom of the list were pre-school aged children with 36% of residents giving an essential or very important rating.

When ratings were compared by respondent demographic subgroups, various statistically significant differences emerged. Generally, residents who had lived in the community for more than 20 years, were aged 55 or older and who were male tended to be less likely to place importance on providing these programs to all listed audiences compared to other survey respondents. Residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color tended to place a higher level of importance on offering these programs for preschool aged children and for organized school field trips compared to other survey respondents. Please indicate how important, if at all, you feel it is for Dakota County to offer various types of programs (such as classes or lessons) to the specific audiences listed below.




When asked about the importance of offering arts, culture and history programs for the same listed audiences, essential or very important ratings ranged from 40% to 57%. At the top of the list with 57% of residents giving essential or very important ratings were people with disabilities and families followed closely by children (ages 5-12) (55%) and organized school field trips (55%). At the bottom of the list were preschool aged children with 40% of residents giving an essential or very important rating.

When ratings were compared by respondent demographic subgroups, various statistically significant differences emerged. Generally, as length of residency, age and household income increased, ratings of importance for programs across the various audiences decreased. Residents who identified as Hispanic and/or Persons of Color tended to place a higher level of importance on offering these programs for almost all audiences compared to other survey respondents (the difference in ratings for teenagers and young adults was not statistically significant). Figure 21: Arts, Culture and History Programs



Please indicate how important, if at all, you feel it is for Dakota County to offer various types of programs (such as classes or lessons) to the specific audiences listed below.



Funding Preferences for Service or Program Improvements

Survey respondents were asked to indicate what methods they would support to pay for improved existing visitor services or programs. Less than a majority of residents indicated support for each of the methods listed on the survey. About one-third of survey respondents indicated that they would be willing to support raising fees on existing uses with permits and making parks a higher priority in the overall County budget. About one-fifth would support charging fees for more park activities that are currently free. Fewer than 2 in 10 indicated support for the remaining methods of paying for improved existing visitor services or programs. Twelve percent indicated they do not support increased spending to improve services in the parks and 18% indicated they don't know.



Preferred Information Sources

When asked what methods they prefer as a way to receive information about Dakota County parks and trails, about 6 in 10 residents indicated they preferred to get information from publications like mailed brochures. Just under half would prefer getting information from the County website or online search and 4 in 10 preferred the County's mailed newsletter. Between 1 in 10 and 2 in 10 preferred flyers or posters, roadside signs, television/cable TV and the radio.

Appendix F: Survey Methodology

Survey Instrument Development

Dakota County has conducted a general residential survey every two or three years for more than 20 years. The general residential surveys ask recipients about their perspectives on the quality of life in the county, use of County amenities, opinion on policy issues facing the County and assessment of County service delivery. This short, single-topic survey was developed to explore key issues in the areas of County parks and regional trails. The survey instrument development process began with a review of the topics to be explored. In an iterative process between County staff and NRC staff, a final five-page questionnaire was developed.

Selecting Survey Recipients

"Sampling" refers to the method by which survey recipients are chosen. The "sample" refers to all those who were given a chance to participate in the survey. All households located in the County's geographic boundaries were eligible for the survey. Because County governments generally do not have inclusive lists of all the residences in the jurisdiction (and tax assessor records databases omit specific addresses for rental units), address lists from the United States Postal Service (USPS), updated every three months, usually provide the best representation of all households in a specific geographic location. NRC used USPS data to randomly select the sample of households (i.e., residential addresses).

A larger list than needed was sampled so that a process referred to as "geocoding" could be used to eliminate addresses from the list that were outside the study boundaries. Geocoding is a computerized process in which addresses are compared to electronically mapped boundaries and coded as inside or outside desired boundaries. All addresses determined to be outside the study boundaries were eliminated from the sample. A random selection was made of the remaining addresses to create a final list of 5,000 addresses. Addresses were also identified by city or township within the County. Addresses in multiple-housing buildings (townhouses, condominiums, apartments) were over-sampled because residents of this type of housing typically respond at lower rates to surveys than do those in detached (single-family) housing units.

An individual within each household was randomly selected to complete the survey using the birthday method.² This instruction was contained in the cover letter accompanying the questionnaire. A copy of the cover letter is included in the appendices at the end of this report.

Survey Administration and Response

Each selected household was contacted three times with survey mailings. First, a pre-notification announcement was sent, informing the household members that they had been selected to participate in the Dakota County survey. Approximately one week after mailing the pre-notification, each household was mailed a survey and a cover letter signed by the Chair of the County Board of Commissioners enlisting participation. The packet also contained a postage-paid return envelope in which the survey recipients could return the completed questionnaire to NRC. A reminder letter and survey, scheduled to arrive one week after the first survey, was the final contact. The second cover letter asked those who had not completed the survey to do so and those who had already done so to refrain from turning in another survey.

² The birthday method selects a person within the household by asking the "person whose birthday has most recently passed" to complete the questionnaire. The underlying assumption in this method is that day of birth has no relationship to the way people respond to surveys.

The mailings were sent in October 2015; completed surveys were collected over the following eight weeks. About 2% of the 5,000 surveys mailed were returned because the housing unit was vacant or the postal service was unable to deliver the survey as addressed. Of the remaining 4,879 households, 896 completed the survey, providing a response rate of 18%. Response rates by location ranged between 13% in South St. Paul and 27% in the geographic sub-area of the County that included the cities of Mendota Heights, Mendota, Sunfish Lake, Lilydale. The overall response rate of 18% is lower than the average response rate typically seen for general resident surveys (typically 20% to 40%) that include a broad range of topics. While the reasons for this lower response rate cannot be confirmed, a potential reason is that this survey was a topic-specific survey that some residents may have felt did not apply to them.

The precision of the estimates made from the survey results is based on the number of surveys received (896) and not based on the response rate. The 896 surveys responses yield a strong level of statistical validity with a margin of error of plus or minus three percentage points around any given percent reported for the entire sample (please see the section titled 95% Confidence Intervals below for more information).

95% Confidence Intervals

The 95% confidence interval (or "margin of error") quantifies the "sampling error" or precision of the estimates made from the survey results. A 95% confidence interval can be calculated for any sample size, and indicates that in 95 of 100 surveys conducted like this one, for a particular item, a result would be found that is within plus or minus three percentage points of the result that would be found if everyone in the population of interest was surveyed. The practical difficulties of conducting any resident survey may introduce other sources of error in addition to sampling error. Despite best efforts to boost participation and ensure potential inclusion of all households, it is to be expected that some residents in selected households will choose not to participate in the survey (potentially introducing non-response error) and some eligible households may be unintentionally excluded from the listed sources for the sample (referred to as coverage error). Each of these types of errors are generally low.

While the 95 percent confidence interval for the survey is generally no greater than plus or minus three percentage points around any given percent reported for the entire sample, results for population subgroups will have wider confidence intervals. Where estimates are given for subgroups, they are less

precise. For each subgroup from the survey, the margin of error rises to as much as plus or minus 10% for a sample size of 100 to plus or minus 5% for 400 completed surveys. The margin of error for each population subgroup identified as under-represented among park visitors are as follows: those who are low-income (7%), seniors (10%), and members of Communities of Color or immigrants (12%).

Survey Processing (Data Entry)

Mailed surveys were submitted via postage-paid business reply envelopes. Completed survey questionnaires were anonymous because NRC did not track addresses, or ask respondents to provide their names, on returned surveys. Geographic location was determined using different colors of paper for each of 12 municipal locations within the County (as shown in above table). Once received, staff assigned a unique identification number to each questionnaire. Additionally, each survey was reviewed and "cleaned" as necessary. For example, a respondent may have selected two options when they were only instructed to select one; staff would choose randomly one of the two selected options to be coded in the survey responses dataset.

Once all surveys were assigned a unique identification number, the question responses were entered into an electronic dataset. This dataset was subject to a data entry protocol of "key and verify," in which survey data were entered twice into an electronic dataset and then compared. Discrepancies were evaluated against the original survey form and corrected. Range checks as well as other forms of quality control were also performed. For example, a question may only have four response options so the values given to the question range from one to four. A range check confirms that a value outside of that range was not entered into the dataset.

Weighting the Data

The primary objective of weighting survey data is to make the survey sample reflective of the larger population of the County. This is done by: 1) reviewing the sample demographics and comparing them to the population norms from the most recent Census or other sources and 2) comparing the responses to different questions for demographic subgroups. The demographic characteristics that are least similar to the Census and yield the most different results are the best candidates for data weighting. Several different weighting tests are conducted to ensure the best fit for the data. The data were weighted by respondent age, gender, race, ethnicity, housing unit type, housing tenure and geographic location. The results of the weighting are presented on the following page.



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
