
1.1 DEMOGRAPHIC ANALYSIS

The Demographic Analysis provides an understanding of service area populations for Thompson Park. For purposes of this analysis, two service areas were created for Thompson Park: a 16 square mile "neighborhood" service area and a 134 square mile "expanded" service area. The analyses are reflective of the total population, and its key characteristics such as age segments, income levels, race, and ethnicity for each service area.


It is important to note that future projections are all based on historical patterns and unforeseen circumstances during or after the time of the projections could have a significant bearing on the validity of the final projections.

1.2 METHODOLOGY

Demographic data used for the analyses was obtained from U.S. Census Bureau and from ESRI, the largest research and development organization dedicated to Geographical Information Systems (GIS) and specializing in population projections and market trends. All data was acquired in July 2018 and reflects actual numbers as reported in the 2010 Censuses and estimates for 2018 and 2023 as obtained by ESRI. Straight line linear regression was utilized for projected 2028 and 2033 demographics. The boundaries for each of the service areas utilized for the demographic analyses are shown below.

1.3 RACE AND ETHNICITY DEFINITIONS


The minimum categories for data on race and ethnicity for Federal statistics, program administrative reporting, and civil rights compliance reporting are defined as below. The Census 2010 data on race are not directly comparable with data from the 2000 Census and earlier censuses; caution must be used when interpreting changes in the racial composition of the US population over time. The latest (Census 2010) definitions and nomenclature are used within this analysis.

- American Indian This includes a person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America), and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment
- Asian This includes a person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent including, for example, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam
- Black This includes a person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa
- Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander This includes a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands
- White This includes a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa
- Hispanic or Latino This is an ethnic distinction, a subset of a race as defined by the Federal Government; this includes a person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race

1.4 THOMPSON PARK POPULACE - (NEIGHBORHOOD)

1.4.1 POPULATION - NEIGHBORHOOD

The "neighborhood" service area's population has experienced a slight growing trend in recent years and is currently estimated at 55,582 individuals. Projecting ahead, the total population is expected to continue to grow over the next 15 years. Based on predictions through 2033, the service area is expected to have 60,905 residents living within 24,560 households.




1.4.2 AGE SEGMENT - NEIGHBORHOOD

Evaluating the population by age segments, the "neighborhood" service area exhibits a fairly balanced distribution among the major age segments. Currently, the largest age segment is the 55+, making up 29.7% of the population.


The overall age composition of the population within the service area is projected to undergo an aging trend. While most of the younger age segments are expected to remain the same or experience slight decreases in population percentage; those who are 55 and older are projected to continue increasing over the next 15 years, making up 34.6% of the population by 2033. This is assumed to be a consequence of a vast amount of the Baby Boomer generation shifting into the senior age segment.

Given the differences in how the active adults (55 and older) participate in park programming, the trend is moving toward having at least two to three different program age segments for older adults. When developing the park and recreation system, the County should evaluate park experiences that would cater to active adults who are 55-64, 65-74, and 75+ age segments.




1.4.3 RACE AND ETHNICTY - NEIGHBORHOOD

In analyzing race, the neighborhood service area's current populations are predominately White Alone. The 2018 estimates show that 70% of the service area's population falls into the White Alone category, while the Black Alone category (9%) represents the largest minority. The predictions for 2033 expect that the service area's population by race will change in that White Alone will decrease by 11% while Black Alone will increase by 5% and the Asian segment will grow by 3%.




Based on the 2018 estimate, those of Hispanic/Latino origin represent 22% of the service area's total population. The Hispanic/Latino population is expected to experience an increase of 7% to 29% by 2033.



1.4.4 HOUSEHOLDS AND INCOME - NEIGHBORHOOD

As seen in chart below, the service area's per capita and median household income levels are below, county, state and national averages.



1.4.5 TAPESTRY SEGMENTATION - NEIGHBORHOOD

Tapestry segmentation provides an accurate, detailed description of service area's residents in which distinctive lifestyle segments are identified based on their socioeconomic and demographic composition.

Many service areas of 15+ square miles have 10+ tapestry segments that make up 40% of its population. The "neighborhood" service area has five segments that comprise 64% of its population. The five tapestry segments that make-up 64% of the service area's population are illustrated in the chart below as well as how they compare to the United States.

Simply, the make-up of "neighborhood" service area is very unique. The tapestry segmentation data is useful information that can assist the department in better understanding the community that they serve.

The following provides a brief description of the five largest tapestry segments in neighborhood service area.

PARKS AND REC

These practical suburbanites have achieved the dream of home ownership. They have purchased homes that are within their means. Their homes are older, and town homes and duplexes are not uncommon. Many of these families are two-income married couples approaching retirement age; they are comfortable in their jobs and their homes, budget wisely, but do not plan on retiring anytime soon or moving. Neighborhoods are well established, as are the amenities and programs that supported their now independent children through school and college. The appeal of these kid-friendly neighborhoods is now attracting a new generation of young couples.

- Cost and practicality come first when purchasing a vehicle; Parks and Rec residents are more likely to buy SUVs or trucks over compact or subcompact vehicles.
- Budget-conscious consumers stock up on staples at warehouse clubs.
- Pass time at home watching documentaries on Animal Planet, Discovery, or History channels. For
 an outing, they choose to dine out at family-style restaurants and attend movies. Between trips
 to the casinos, they gamble on lottery tickets and practice their blackjack and poker skills online.

- Convenience is important in the kitchen; they regularly use frozen or packaged main course meals. Ground coffee is preferred over coffee beans.
- Residents here take advantage of local parks and recreational activities. Their exercise routine is a balance of home-based exercise; a session at their local community gym; or a quick jog, swim, or run.

FRONT PORCHES

Front Porches blends household types, with more young families with children or single households than average. This group is also more diverse than the US. More than half of householders are renters, and many of the homes are older town homes or duplexes. Friends and family are central to Front Porches residents and help to influence household buying decisions. Households tend to own just one vehicle but used only when needed. Income and net worth of these residents are well below the US average.

MARKET PROFILE:

- Go online for gaming, watching movies, employment searches, and posting pics on social media.
- Prefer cellphones over landlines and use their mobile devices for entertainment such as streaming movies and music.
- Drink energy and sports drinks.
- Participate in leisure activities including sports, playing board games and video games.
- Watch Comedy Central, Nickelodeon, and PBS Kids Sprout.

OLD AND NEWCOMERS

This market features singles' lifestyles, on a budget. The focus is more on convenience than consumerism, economy over acquisition. Old and Newcomers is composed of neighborhoods in transition, populated by renters who are just beginning their careers or retiring. Some are still in college; some are taking adult education classes. They support charity causes and are environmentally conscious. Age is not always obvious from their choices.

- Residents have a strong sense of community. They volunteer for charities, help fund raise, and recycle.
- They prefer cell phones to landlines.
- Entertainment features the Internet (employment searches, rating products, updating social media profiles), watching movies at home, listening to country music, and reading the paper.
- Vehicles are basically just a means of transportation.
- Food features convenience, frozen and fast food.
- They do banking as likely in person as online.

BRIGHT YOUNG PROFESSIONALS

Bright Young Professionals is a large market, primarily located in urban outskirts of large metropolitan areas. These communities are home to young, educated, working professionals. More than one out of three householders are under the age of 35. Slightly more diverse couples dominate this market, with more renters than homeowners. More than two-fifths of the households live in single-family homes; over a third live in 5+ unit buildings. Labor force participation is high, generally white-collar work, with a mix of food service and part-time jobs (among the college students). Median household income, median home value, and average rent are close to the US values. Residents of this segment are physically active and up on the latest technology.

MARKET PROFILE:

- Own retirement savings and student loans.
- Own newer computers (desktop, laptop, or both), iPods, and 2+ TVs.
- Go online and use mobile devices for banking, access YouTube or Facebook, visit blogs, download movies, and play games.
- Use cell phones to text, redeem mobile coupons, listen to music, and check for news and financial information.
- Find leisure going to bars/clubs, attending concerts, going to the beach, and renting DVDs from Redbox or Netflix.
- Enjoy a variety of sports, including backpacking, rock climbing, football, Pilates, running, and yoga.
- Eat out often at fast-food and family restaurants.

RUSTBELT TRADITIONS

The backbone of older industrial cities in states surrounding the Great Lakes, *Rustbelt Traditions* residents are a mix of married-couple families and singles living in older developments of single-family homes. While varied, the work force is primarily white collar, with a higher concentration of skilled workers in manufacturing, retail trade, and health care. *Rustbelt Traditions* represents a large market of stable, hard-working consumers with modest incomes but an average net worth of nearly \$400,000. Family oriented, they value time spent at home. Most have lived, worked, and played in the same area for years.

- Residents take advantage of convenience stores for fueling up and picking up incidentals.
- Watching television is a common pastime; many households have more than four TVs.
- Favorite programming ranges from ABC Family Channel, A&E, and TNT to children's shows on Nickelodeon and the Disney Channel.

NEIGHBORHOOD SERVICE AREA DEMOGRAPHIC IMPLICATIONS

The following implications are derived from the analyses provided above. Each implication is organized by the outlined demographic information sections.

POPULATION

The population is slightly increasing and is projected to experience a 9.6% population growth over the next 15 years. With a growing population, park and recreation services must continue to grow to keep up with the population.

AGE SEGMENTATION

The service area has a very broad age segmentation with the largest group being 55+ with the second largest group being 35-54. This is significant as providing access to services and programs will need to be focused on multitude of age segments simultaneously and equally challenging as age segments have different likings towards activities. Equal distribution across all age segments will require the County to continue to provide programs, services, parks and facilities that appeal to all residents of the neighborhood service area.

RACE AND ETHNICITY

A slightly diversifying population will likely focus the County on providing traditional and non-traditional programming and service offerings while always seeking to identify emerging activities.

HOUSEHOLDS AND INCOME

With a median and per capita household income below that of county, state and national averages, it would be important for the County to prioritize providing offerings that are first class with exceptional customer service while de-emphasizing the need to create revenue generation.



1.5.1 POPULATION - EXPANDED

The "expanded" service area's population has experienced a slight growing trend in recent years and is currently estimated at 215,643 individuals. Projecting ahead, the total population is expected to continue to grow over the next 15 years. Based on predictions through 2033, the service area is expected to have 240,652 residents living within 95,233 households.




1.5.2 AGE SEGMENT - EXPANDED

Evaluating the population by age segments, the "expanded" service area exhibits a fairly balanced distribution among the major age segments. Currently, the largest age segment is the 55+, making up 28.8% of the population.



While most of the younger age segments are expected to remain the same or experience slight decreases in population percentage; those who are 55 and older are projected to continue increasing over the next 15 years, making up 36.9% of the population by 2033. This is assumed to be a consequence of a vast amount of the Baby Boomer generation shifting into the senior age segment.

Given the differences in how the active adults (55 and older) participate in park programming, the trend is moving toward having at least two to three different program age segments for older adults. When developing the park and recreation system, the County should evaluate park experiences that would cater to active adults who are 55-64, 65-74, and 75+ age segments.




1.5.3 RACE AND ETHNICTY - EXPANDED



Trends Analysis

The Trends Analysis provides an understanding of national, regional, and local recreational trends as well as generational participation trends. Trends data used for this analysis was obtained from Sports & Fitness Industry Association's (SFIA), National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA), and Environmental Systems Research Institute, Inc. (ESRI). All trends data is based on current and/or historical participation rates, statistically-valid survey results, or NRPA Park Metrics.

1.1.1 NATIONAL TRENDS IN RECREATION

METHODOLOGY

The Sports & Fitness Industry Association's (SFIA) Sports, Fitness & Recreational Activities Topline Participation Report 2019 was utilized in evaluating the following trends:

- National Sport and Fitness Participatory Trends
- Core vs. Casual Participation Trends
- · Participation by Generation
- Non-Participant Interest by Age Segment



The study is based on findings from surveys carried out in 2018 by the Physical Activity Council (PAC), resulting in a total of 20,069 online interviews. Surveys were administered to all genders, ages, income levels, regions, and ethnicities to allow for statistical accuracy of the national population. A sample size of 20,069 completed interviews is considered by SFIA to result in a high degree of statistical accuracy. A sport with a participation rate of five percent has a confidence interval of plus or minus 0.31 percentage points at a 95 percent confidence interval. Using a weighting technique, survey results are applied to the total U.S. population figure of 300,652,039 people (ages six and older). The purpose of the report is to establish levels of activity and identify key participatory trends in recreation across the U.S.

CORE VS. CASUAL PARTICIPATION

In addition to overall participation rates, SFIA further categorizes active participants as either core or casual participants based on frequency. Core participants have higher participatory frequency than casual participants. The thresholds that define casual versus core participation may vary based on the nature of each individual activity. For instance, core participants engage in most fitness and recreational activities more than 50 times per year, while for sports, the threshold for core participation is typically 13 times per year.

In a given activity, core participants are more committed and tend to be less likely to switch to other activities or become inactive (engage in no physical activity) than causal participants. This may also explain why activities with more core participants tend to experience less pattern shifts in participation rates than those with larger groups of casual participants.

1.1.2 NATIONAL TRENDS IN OUTDOOR RECREATION

PARTICIPATION LEVELS

Results from the SFIA report demonstrate a contrast of growth and decline in participation regarding outdoor/adventure recreation activities. Much like the general fitness activities, these activities encourage an active lifestyle, can be performed individually or within a group, and are not as limited by time constraints. In 2018, the most popular activities, in terms of total participants, from the outdoor/adventure recreation category include: Day Hiking (47.9 million), Road Bicycling (39.0 million), Freshwater Fishing (39.0 million), and Camping within ¼ mile of Vehicle/Home (27.4 million), and Recreational Vehicle Camping (16.0 million).

FIVE-YEAR TREND

From 2013-2018, BMX Bicycling (58.6%), Day Hiking (39.2%), Fly Fishing (18.1%), Backpacking Overnight (16.2%), and Recreational Vehicle Camping (9.8%) have undergone the largest increases in participation.

The five-year trend also shows activities such as In-Line Roller Skating (-17.8%), Birdwatching (-12.8%), Camping within ¼ mile of Home/Vehicle (-6.3%), and Road Bicycling (-4.5%) experiencing the largest decreases in participation.

ONE-YEAR TREND

The one-year trend shows activities growing most rapidly being Day Hiking (6.6%), Camping within $\frac{1}{4}$ mile of Home/Vehicle (-16.5%), and Fly Fishing (18.1%). Over the last year, activities that underwent the largest decreases in participation include: Adventure Racing (-12.4%), In-Line Roller Skating (-4.3%), and Overnight Backpacking (-4.0).

CORE VS. CASUAL TRENDS IN OUTDOOR RECREATION

A large majority of outdoor activities have experienced participation growth in the last five-years, with In-Line Roller Skating, Birdwatching, Camping within ¼ mile of Home/Vehicle, and Road Bicycling being the only activities decreasing in participation. Although this a positive trend for outdoor activities, it should be noted that a large majority of participation growth came from an increase in casual users. This is likely why we see a lot more activities experiencing decreases in participation when assessing the one-year trend, as the casual users likely found alternative activities to participate in. Please see Appendix A for full Core vs. Casual Participation breakdown.

1.1.3 NATIONAL TRENDS IN WATER SPORTS / ACTIVITIES PARTICIPATION LEVELS

The most popular water sports / activities based on total participants in 2018 were Recreational Kayaking (11.0 million), Canoeing (9.1 million), and Snorkeling (7.8 million). It should be noted that water activity participation tends to vary based on regional, seasonal, and environmental factors. A region with more water access and a warmer climate is more likely to have a higher participation rate in water activities than a region that has long winter seasons or limited water access. Therefore, when assessing trends in water sports and activities, it is important to understand that fluctuations may be the result of environmental barriers which can greatly influence water activity participation.

FIVE-YEAR TREND

Over the last five years, Stand-Up Paddling (73.3%) was by far the fastest growing water activity, followed by Recreational Kayaking (26.4%), White Water Kayaking (19.4%), Boardsailing/Windsurfing (17.5%), and Sea/Tour Kayaking (4.1%). From 2013-2018, activities declining in participation most rapidly were Surfing (-21.4%), Water Skiing (-20.0%), Jet Skiing (-17.0%), Wakeboarding (-15.7%), and Rafting (-11.3%).

ONE-YEAR TREND

Contradicting the five-year trend, Surfing was the fasting growing of all water sports/activities increasing 7.2% in 2018. Recreational Kayaking (4.6%) and Stand-Up Paddling (3.8%) also had a spike in participation this past year. Activities which experienced the largest decreases in participation in the most recent year include: Wakeboarding (-7.0%), Snorkeling (-6.8), and Water Skiing (-5.9%)

CORE VS. CASUAL TRENDS IN WATER SPORTS/ACTIVITIES

As mentioned previously, regional, seasonal, and environmental limiting factors may influence the participation rate of water sport and activities. These factors may also explain why all water-based activities have drastically more casual participants than core participants, since frequencies of activities may be constrained by uncontrollable factors. These high causal user numbers are likely why a majority of water sports/activities have experienced decreases in participation in recent years. 1.1.4 PARTICIPATION BY GENERATION

Analyzing participation by age for recreational activities reveals that fitness and outdoor sports were the most common activities across all generations. Breaking down activity level by generation shows a converse correlation between age and healthy activity rates.



Generation Z were the most active, with only 17.9% of the population identifying as inactive. Approximately 81% of individuals within this generation were deemed high calorie burning in 2018; with 36.7% being active high calorie and 34.1% being casual high calorie.






Millennials (born 1980-1999)

Almost half (42.0%) of millennials were active high calorie (35.4%) or active & high calorie (11.3%), while 24.0% claimed they were inactive. Even though this inactive rate is much higher than Generation Z's (17.6%), it is still below the national inactive rate (28%).

Generation X (born 1965-1979)

Generation X has the second highest active to a healthy level rate (35.0%) among all generations, only being 0.4% less than Millennials. At the same time, they also have the second highest inactive rate, with 28.1% not active at all.





The Boomers (born 1945-1964)

The Boomers were the least active generation, with an inactive rate of 33.3%. This age group tends to participate in less intensive activities. Approximately 34% claimed to engage in casual & low/med calorie (4.3%) or low/med calorie (29.6%) burning activities.

1.1.5 NON-PARTICIPANT INTEREST BY AGE SEGMENT

In addition to participation rates by generation, SFIA also tracks non-participant interest. These are activities that the U.S. population currently does <u>not</u> participate in due to physical or monetary barriers, but is interested in participating in. Below are the top five activities that each age segment would be most likely to partake in, if they were readily available.

Overall, the activities most age segments are interested in include: Camping, Bicycling, Fishing, and Swimming for Fitness. All of which are deemed as low-impact activities, making them obtainable for any age segment to enjoy.

Cultural Resources

Legislative Requirements

Federal

National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (16 U.S.C. §§470a to 470w-6)

The National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA) requires federal agencies to take into account the effects of their undertakings on historic and cultural resources. A federal undertaking under NHPA is defined as

a project, activity, or program funded in whole or in part under the direct or indirect jurisdiction of a federal agency, including those carried out by or on behalf of a federal agency; those carried out with federal financial assistance; those requiring a federal permit, license or approval; and those subject to State or local regulation administered pursuant to a delegation or approval by a federal agency. (42 CFR 137.289).

Key components of the NHPA include the following:

- » The establishment of the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), the nation's official list of cultural resources worthy of preservation;
- » The establishment of a State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for each state and a Tribal Historic Preservation Office (THPO) for each federally recognized tribe; and
- » Section 106 of the NHPA requires federal agencies to consider the effect of their activities on historic properties and to afford the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) the opportunity to comment on those activities.

Under Section 106 of the NHPA, the responsible federal agency must determine whether the undertaking could affect historic properties, identify the appropriate SHPO(s) and THPO(s) to consult with, and involve the public and other potential consulting parties. Once historic properties are identified, the federal agency, in consultation with the above mentioned parties, determines which if any historic properties will be adversely affected. If the undertaking will result in an adverse effect, and the adverse effect cannot be avoided, it must be minimized and mitigated.

An example of a type of Dakota County project that must comply with Section 106 of the NHPA is any project that receives funding through the federal Land & Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), which "provides matching grants to state and tribal governments for the acquisition and development of public parks and other outdoor recreation sites."

National Environmental Protection Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 4321-4347)

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), was enacted on January 1, 1969 and establishes national environmental policy as well as goals for the protection, maintenance and enhancement of the environment, and provides a process for implementing these goals within federal agencies. It also established the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ). While it is often considered to be primarily an environmental law, one of NEPA's stated goals is to "preserve important historic, cultural, and natural aspects of our national heritage." Under NEPA, federal or federally assisted projects must also take into account effects to historic and cultural resources. The most significant section of NEPA as it pertains to planning is Section 102, which requires federal agencies to incorporate environmental considerations in their planning and decision-making through a systematic interdisciplinary approach. Section 102 specifically requires federal agencies to prepare detailed statements assessing the environmental impact of and alternatives to major federal actions significantly affecting the environment, which are known as environmental impact statements (EISs).

State

There are several state statutes that address cultural resources in Minnesota. Several of these laws are found in Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 138, including the Minnesota Field Archaeology Act, the Minnesota Historic Sites Act, and the Minnesota Historic Districts Act. Other state laws relating to preservation and cultural resources include: Municipal Heritage Preservation, the Minnesota Private Cemeteries Act, and the Minnesota Environmental Rights Act (MERA). The Environmental Quality Board (EQB) also maintains several rules pertaining to the protection of cultural resources.

Minnesota Field Archaeology Act (M.S. 138.31 – 138.42), 1963

This Act creates the Office of the State Archaeologist (OSA); requires licensing to engage in archaeology on non-federal public land; establishes ownership, custody, and use of objects and data recovered during survey; and requires state agencies to submit development plans to the State Archaeologist, Minnesota Historical Society (MNHS) and the Minnesota Indian Affairs Council for review when there are known or suspected archaeological sites in the area.

Minnesota Historic Sites Act (M.S. 138.661 – 138.6691), 1965

This Act establishes the State Historic Sites Network and the State Register of Historic Places (SRHP), and requires that state agencies consult with SHPO before undertaking or licensing projects that may affect properties on the Network, the SRHP, or the NRHP. M.S. 138.665, subdivision 2 was amended in 2017 and put into effect on March 1, 2018, as part of the transfer of the powers, duties, responsibilities, personal, assets, and unexpended funds relating to functions assigned to SHPO to the Department of Administration (Office of the Revisor of Statutes 2017).

Minnesota Historic Districts Act (M.S. 138.71-138.75), 1971

The Minnesota Historic Districts Act designates certain historic districts throughout the state and includes enabling legislation that allows local governing bodies to create commissions to maintain architectural design review control over these areas.

Minnesota Private Cemeteries Act (M.S. 307.08), 1975

The intent and scope of the Minnesota Private Cemeteries Act is to provide all human burials and human skeletal remains with equal treatment and to respect their human dignity irrespective to their ethnic origins, cultural backgrounds, or religious affiliations. The provisions of this section protect all human burials or human skeletal remains found on or in all public or private lands or waters in Minnesota and makes it a felony to intentionally, willfully, or knowingly destroy, mutilate, injure, disturb, or remove human skeletal remains or human burial grounds.

Minnesota Environmental Policy Act (M.S. 116D.01 -116D.11), 1973

The Minnesota Environmental Policy Act (MEPA) was set forth to protect environmental resources. The development of Environmental Assessment Worksheets (EAW) and Environmental Impact Statements (EIS) were set forth in this act. The EAW is a brief description of the basic facts involved in a proposed action and is used to determine if an EIS is required. In regards to the EIS, the act states, "Where there is potential for significant environmental effects resulting from any major governmental action, the action shall be preceded by a detailed environmental impact statement prepared by the responsible governmental unit."The purpose of the EIS is to describe the proposed action, analyze its significant environmental impacts, discuss appropriate alternatives to the proposed action and their impacts, and it explores methods by which adverse environmental impacts of an action could be mitigated. The act also specifically protects cultural resources as stated in chapter 116D.02 (d).

Minnesota Environmental Rights Act (M.S. 166B.02), 1971

The Minnesota Environmental Rights Act (MERA) declares that each person is entitled by right to the protection, preservation, and enhancement of air, water, land, and other natural resources located within the state and that each person has the responsibility to contribute to the protection, preservation, and enhancement thereof. Within the definitions of this act, historic resources are included in the definition of natural resources. The goal of this law is to create and maintain within the state conditions under which human beings and nature can exist in productive harmony in order that present and future generations may enjoy clean air and water, productive land, and other natural resources by providing adequate civil remedy to protect these resources from pollution, impairment, or destruction. To accomplish this feat, the act enables residents and entities of Minnesota the right to a civil suit in order to protect the air, water, land, and other natural resources of the state, including historic resources.

Previous Cultural Resource Investigations

A literature review was conducted to identify known cultural resources within Thompson County Park. This literature review consisted of a review of inventory records, reports, and site files at SHPO and the OSA. For the protection of archaeological resources, no site locations are included in this report.

An archaeological survey was conducted in 2002 along a proposed 0.7-mile segment of the North Urban Regional Trail (NURT) system through Thompson County Park, in which a preliminary visual inspection was conducted to assess the archaeological potential and survey needs of the project route (Harrison 2002). One archaeological site, consisting of a lithic scatter, was recorded as Simons Ravine I (21DK74) (Harrison 2002).

Architectural History Properties

No architectural history properties have been identified within the boundaries of Thompson County Park.

Traditional Cultural Properties

No traditional cultural properties have been formally recorded within the park. This report does not address potential cultural or sacred sites of significance to Native Americans that may arise during any potential consultation between a federal agency and tribes.

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Phase 1 Community Engagement

Overview

Community engagement events for the first phase of the Thompson County Park Master Plan were held in June through October 2018. The purpose of the events was to engage a representative cross section of Dakota County residents, park users, and stakeholder organizations to collect meaningful input, build consensus, and generate interest for the park master planning process. The project team was especially mindful of reaching out to those who may live around the park but are not park users.

In total, there were more than a dozen engagement activities with nearly 1,000 people engaged. Events were conducted using various formats including pop-ups at existing community events, individual and agency meetings, stakeholder meetings, and emails and phone calls. Two online surveys were also conducted: a general survey was conducted on Social Pinpoint in English and Spanish and a Survey Monkey survey was sent to past renters of the North Picnic Shelter and Dakota Lodge. Event locations, date, and target populations are shown in Table 1 on the next page.

In addition to participating in local events, information about the planning process was distributed to residents in West St. Paul, South St. Paul, and Inver-Grove Heights. Approximately 700 flyers were distributed to be included in block party packets for the August 2018 Night to Unite. A letter was also sent to approximately 500 residents who live around the park.

Highlights

Below is a summary of the key themes from the Phase 1 engagement events. This summary encompasses the survey results, stakeholder meetings, one-on-one conversations with staff, and input from the pop-up events. A full summary of each engagement event is found in the *Individual Event Summaries Section* that follows.

Overall, the community outreach indicates that Thompson County Park is well loved. The setting, mixture of activities, and shelter/lodge rental bring a wide range of people to the park. Regular park users, as may be indicated from the Social Pinpoint results, likely come on a weekly to monthly basis. Outside of events and programming at the Activity Center, draws of Thompson County Park include walking/hiking, being in nature, picnicking, and using the playground. While Thompson County Park is nestled in a urban neighborhood, the majority of park users still come via car rather than on foot or bike. The following are major themes heard from input:

- » Retention and improvement of the natural areas The natural areas were cited as an amenity to preserve, maintain, and improve. This includes water quality in Thompson Lake, as well as the southern half of the park.
- » Recreational use of the lake People were interested in expanded use of the lake through additional fishing opportunities and small craft rental of paddleboards or kayaks.
- » Expanded recreation Users would like more to do at the park. Examples of the types of activities suggested include splash pad or mister, nature ninja course, nature play area, zipline, rock wall, outdoor workout stations, and community garden.
- » Visitor amenities Input identified a number of wishes to improve the park experience, including more picnic tables and BBQs; shade for the playground; small craft rental; equipment check-out for geocaching or lawn games; trail markers; wayfinding; benches; water fountains; port-a-potties; and nature interpretation.
- » Park maintenance improvements Some identified an overall need for park clean-up. Others suggested improvements that would assist with maintaining the park's appearance such as dog waste stations and more recycling and trash receptacles.
- » Focus on accessibility Many of the conversations in the first phase identified opportunities for improved accessibility. This is likely the results of many factors, including having the Activity Center, its relatively flat topography in the main activity area, and its role for community gathering. An accessibility and inclusion walk provided a lot of detailed information in the areas of trails, parking, restrooms, playground, seating, shade, wayfinding, events, and maintenance.
- » Expanded winter use a few expressed a desire for groomed ski trails and snowshoe rental so there could be more use of the park in the winter.
- » More events Input indicates an interest in more inter-generational events, family events, and events designed for those with special needs.

Individual Event Summaries

Social Pinpoint

Social Pinpoint is an online engagement tool that provides multiple ways for users to share their thoughts about the park. For the first phase the website used both the survey and the map based comment tools to solicit input. The website was made available in both Spanish and English.


Survey Responses


Map-Based Comments


How often do you visit the park?






Survey Monkey

In order to better understand the experience of those who have rented the North Picnic Shelter or the Dakota Lodge, a Survey Monkey survey was created and a link to the survey was sent via email. A total of 61 surveys were received. The response rate for rental purpose was spread rather evenly among survey respondents, with business purposes (meeting/retreat and organization/non-profit/governmental/corporate event) receiving 2% more responses than family, wedding, or anniversary related events.


Overall, respondents seem pleased with the existing rental facilities at Thompson County Park, the most popular of which being the Dakota Lodge. Concerns that were raised regarded parking capacity, wayfinding throughout the park, park safety (particularly the need for lighting), park upkeep and maintenance, the availability of technology and technical assistance, and the proximity of park amenities.




Facility usage for Thompson County Park tends to lean toward the Dakota Lodge and the parking areas, with the next highest response (picnic shelters) receiving less than half the responses as the Dakota Lodge. Other identified facilities included geocaching and horse shoes.




Every noted existing park facility received above a 4/5 rating on average from survey respondents, with the picnic shelter and trails gaining the highest ratings. The only comments identified a desire for more parking, as well as pathway connecting parking to other park amenities.



The majority of park users attending events use Thompson County Park a few times a year. The "Other" category received a large number of responses and was mainly populated by users who had only visited the park once for an event or activity.



Park users attending events overwhelmingly arrive by driving a car, with less than 6% of participants reporting to have arrived by alternative means of transportation.

Stakeholder Meetings

Stakeholder Meeting - July 23, 2018

Two stakeholder meetings were held at Thompson County Park. The meetings were intended to gather insight on what is working well at the park, where changes are needed, how existing partnerships can be strengthened, and what new partnerships may be possible. The meetings were attended by representatives of a mix of cities, community organizations, and community representatives, including West St. Paul Police, Wentworth Library, Family Voices MN, Dakota County Veteran Services, Dakota County Social Services, Dakota County Public Health, YMCA, City of Inver Grove Heights, Dakota County Public Arts, Caponi Art Park, and MnDNR.

HOW COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS USE THE PARK NOW?

The Y doesn't use the park; could build partnerships between YMCA and County. When the River to River Greenway is finished there will be an improved connection.

Rotary uses Dakota Lodge for training/education.

West St. Paul Law enforcement uses the park and Dakota Lodge for law enforcement training and outreach events including Junior SWAT program, fishing events, and presentations to seniors.

Dakota County Social Services used Dakota Lodge for its Autism outreach. The lodge is a more welcoming and less intimidating place than other government buildings.

MnDNR partners with Dakota County on the Take a Kid Fishing event. The DNR works with Humbolt High School to stock the fish.

BARRIERS TO PARK USE OR ENJOYMENT

Many people don't know where the park ends and begins and don't understand what there is to do in the park. There is a lack of awareness in the park among people who live in the neighborhood.

The park does not have a strong street presence on Butler and the name is confusing. People think it is on Thompson Ave. The neighborhood entrances to the park are not well signed or welcoming.

The noise from Highway 52 defines the park experience on the south east side.

Better signage is needed in the park. In particular, the parking is confusing. The only visible lot is by the lake and people are not sure if they should park there or keep going.

Improved signage in the park so people know where to go and can get a sense of what the experience and conditions will be like (ie, unpaved trail, no restroom facilities, distance, elevation change, etc.)

Transportation issue for those without cars and older adults. Public transportation/walkability could be improved.

People are unaware of the park.

People need to feel safe in parks. West St. Paul Police has had successful program on Wednesdays in the summer in Southview Park. Kids bring other kids and everyone feels safe because officers are there. This program is primarily is attended by Latinos who live in the immediate area.

Prohibitive cost of equipment for certain activities.

Seniors would benefit from more paved trails – particularly around the lake.

Adequate and accessible trash/recycling receptacles to facilitate a "Leave No Footprint philosophy for park users"

Fear or lack of knowledge about the outdoors and outdoor activities.

More benches are needed – it would be helpful for those who are concerned about distances to know they are out there and where they are.

Restrooms are needed, particularly on the south end of the park.

POTENTIAL IMPROVEMENTS TO FACILITIES, AMENITIES, ACTIVITIES OR ACCESSIBILITY

The park design could be more inclusive particularly for people living with disabilities.

- » Family restrooms are needed so that those with sensory sensitivity can avoid hand driers and auto-flush toilets.
- » Paper towels are needed, especially in a family restroom so that those with sensory sensitivity do not need to use the hand-driers. Paper towels are also needed for older adults when incontinence is an issue and for parents with children in diapers.
- » More paved and even trail surfaces options, benches for resting, call boxes in case of emergency.
- » A fenced playground to prevent kids who bolt/run from getting away.
- » Pay attention to ADA parking spaces; designate some spaces as van only.
- » Explore potential sponsors for a golf cart for events (City of Shoreview has this).

Programing for populations with special needs (sensory-friendly programming, programs for people with dementia and their caregivers).

Multilingual signage to be inclusive of and to reflect our diverse community makeup, including Braille on signage

Awareness walks are gaining in popularity. If you host them a place to gather is needed.

Lebanon Hills Visitor Center has a nice set up for as a community space – for instance there are Moms groups who use the space.

Dads support groups tend to enjoy activities as a way to bond. For example, snowshoeing, making beef jerky.

Utilization of the lodge in the winter as an indoor space/warming space.

Lighting would help to make trail safer.

The building needs a breastfeeding space.

Offer equipment rentals: snowshoes, kayaks; paddleboat, paddleboard.

Host family and smaller events; sleigh rides, arts and crafts, nature scavenger hunt to get people out.

The library has partnered with Dakota County Parks on Story walks, could expand to include multi lingual stories.

Could have more permanent displays around the lake for story walk, local art, or art from area schools

An idea for an event is a story walk with bonfire

Pull up bar challenges

Nature Ninja – family friendly challenge elements in the south end of the park

Family yoga, adaptive yoga

Start a Take a Kid Ice Fishing Event

Maintain geocaches around the lake or in strategic locations to draw people to places in the park.

Free events like music and movies in the park help people discover the parks.

Utilize Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design Principles to make the park safe.

Add shade canopy.

There are not enough trash receptacles; there is trash everywhere in this park

It would be helpful to have better information about trail mileage [for trail running]

Arts are a way to bring people together, particularly different ethnic and cultural groups

Parking is a limitation. If you are going to hold events and programs you need to have adequate parking. Right-size events for available parking.

Would love to see fishing rentals & bait in this park. It is one of the only lakes in the area with a fishing pier.

Consider ways to draw people into the south end of the park. This may mean recreation more development & car access south of Dakota Lodge. More accessible trails will open the south end of the park to a broader audience.

Consider a sound wall along Highway 52

Youth Retreat Space

A shelter for programs

Add misters or a splash pad for warm days. Splash pads are very successful in Kelly Park in Apple Valley and Harmon Park in West St. Paul.

Sell ice cream

Improve the River to River Trail – better signage, water, restrooms close to the trail.

Program with trail with foot or bicycle races

Promote Simon's Ravine for 'hill training'. Embrace the steep grate

Add a nature play space. The new one in Patrick Eagan Park is very popular

To encourage use of the south end of the park create a hidden playground in the woods –add whimsy, for example make it a fairlyland

Intergenerational programming

Community gardens; the garden at Dodge Nature Center is expensive; the Garlough Garden has struggled

Consider serving summer meals

Dakota Lodge is one of the only large meeting spaces in the area; there may be ways to partner with Dakota County Social services to better utilize Dakota Lodge as a community space.

The Wentworth Library and St. Paul Police Department partner on a Bike Rodeo. There may be a need in the future for a larger space.

West St. Paul Police department holds a Safety Camp and Safe Summer nights events. There may be an opportunity to hold these events in Thompson Park in the future.

Collaborations with neighboring Dakota tribal nations for cultural programming on traditional Indigenous scientific knowledge (star knowledge, ethnobotany, animal stories told only during winter etc.)

Partnership with the University of Minnesota for citizen scientist classes or meetups for children, teens, adults, older adults

Monthly 'current events-burning issues' discussion on community relevant issues such as climate change, groundwater pollution, mining in Minnesota, economics, environmentalism, pesticide use etc with local expert speakers.

Classes/activities/meetups including citizen scientists, naturalists, birdwatching, entomology, wildflower/plant identification/harvest, use, etc.

Partner with local arts organizations for visual and preforming arts in the park

The Y has health related programs and could utilize the trails.

Thompson Park Activity Center Advisory Committee Meeting – July 26, 2018

GENERAL COMMENTS

Not enough parking in the upper is an issue on a weekly basis ~ typically during the day when there is an event at Dakota Lodge and the Activity Center is busy. Seniors parking in the lakeside lot is a problem especially in winter.

The drop off drive in front of the building is confusing, it should be one way.

Most people drive to the park, some use metro mobility.

The sightlines between the Activity Center door and the front desk need to be better for safety. There are no cameras, no security. There is a fundamental circulation flow problem between the activity center door and the front desk.

Activity Center has no identification on monument sign on Butler. There are so many events; it would be great to have electronic sign board that can be changed.

In plan, use the terminology 55+, not older adult.

It would be great to have more activities outside. If there was a better connection to the patio, outdoor classroom, shade. Any seating should have arms; it is best if it could be movable. If there was shade art classes, science, and book clubs could be outside.

More activity at the lake – paddle boards, walks for different age groups

Concerns about security on the wooded trails – both from crime and also if someone falls on the trail and can't get back to the Activity center. Some things that could help are paved trails, benches, walking with a buddy programs, call boxes.

It would be nice to have interpretive signs and signs identifying native vegetation.

Fire pits for when it is cold; misters for when it is hot.

A smooth surface $\frac{1}{4}$ mile or less would be great for outdoor 55+ exercises classes.

There are lots of dog walkers in the park

Games for Adults 55+ would be great, pickelball, bocce

Accessibility and Inclusion Focus Group - September 14, 2018

ACCESSIBILITY AND INCLUSION FOCUS GROUP COMMENTS

PAVED TRAILS

Hills and steep grades are an issue in many places: right off the parking lot, near the picnic shelter, between the building and the playground, just south of the building by the lake. In some of these places a railing would be helpful.

In many areas the pavement needs repair: heaving and sinking have led to uneven surfaces, cracking, edges of pavement by the lake is eroding.

Lime bikes parked on the trail do not leave enough space for wheelchairs

Ag lime surface on the west side of the lake means people with disabilities cannon go around the lake; it would be much better for those living with disabilities if the trail was paved

It would be nice if there was at least one additional paved trail loop south of Thompson Activity Center

Another, less hilly trail option is needed connecting Butler Ave to Dakota Lodge



ADA spaces at the parking lot corners are difficult to get out of. An even surface not next to the curb is best.



Ramps on vans often take up the entire designated space, leaving no space to maneuver. An additional 5' at van spaces.



Bikes parked on trail make reduce space for wheelchairs



Pitted and cracked surface is difficult for those with mobility limitations



Railings in areas with steeper slopes would be help





Restroom signage should indicate that these are family restrooms and that they are accessible. The facility is good, but the communication needs to be improved.

ACCESSIBILITY AND INCLUSION FOCUS GROUP COMMENTS

ROAD CIRCULATION

Entrance road needs striping so people know that it is two way

Thompson Activity Center drop off is difficult to understand – one way or two way. There should be a covered passenger drop off area, the building portico could be extended

PARKING

Additional accessible van spaces are needed. At least one along the west parking lot row would be nice. The space between van spaces must be at least 5' wider to account for the van ramp.

ADA spaces should not be adjacent to the curb. This condition leaves no space for the person getting out of the car to exit onto an even, at grade surface.

RESTROOMS

A family restroom is needed with a bench for adult diaper changing (for example, a chiropractic bench). Space around the bench needs to be wide enough for a caregiver to maneuver.

Soap dispensers need to be labeled and needing to push to dispense soap is not ideal.

All signs should indicate where the accessible family restrooms. Sign at playground does not communicate this, neither does the sign above the outdoor restrooms at the building.

WATER

More drinking fountains, add some on trails south of the building.

Drinking fountains should have levers instead of push buttons, have two heights, and a pet level.

Add a dispenser to fill water bottles in the Thompson Park Center building.

PLAYGROUND

The playground is not accessible.

There is only one paved trail leading to a playground entrance.

Resilient surfacing would be better than woodchips.

The accessible swing is nice, but the resilient surface around it needs to be twice as wide to allow a caregiver to maneuver and a wheelchair to be unloaded beside it.

Other swing options to explore adding are a wheelchair swing and swings with platform seats that are easier to get into.

Adult swings are needed, swinging is sensory.

Wood decking is in disrepair.

Signage is jumbled and difficult to read. Could be consolidated.

Restroom sign is small and faded, does not indicate that it is directing people to an accessible restroom.

A fenced playground is desirable to contain kids who run/bolt.

SENSORY AREA

Could have a sensory area for those with sensory sensitivity.

FISHING

Dock railings are loose/wobbly.

Signage in multiple languages is needed regarding fishing rules and regulations.

HORSESHOES

Not accessible.

No seating/benches.

SEATING AND PICNIC TABLES

More seating is needed. Benches along the trails should be at least every 1/8 mile.

A variety of seat types is desired. Some with arms, some with backs, some with everything.

Shade is needed where there are benches.

Seating with lake views is great, manage vegetation so lake can be seen from a seated position.

Create some more private seating 'nooks' with lake views and along the trails in the south end of the park. This will allow people to be in and enjoy nature.

Arms on benches help people get in and out of the chairs.

Accessible seating and tables are needed in the Dakota Lodge lobby.

Accessible picnic tables are needed.

Picnic table bench seating is difficult for many people to get in and out of.

Moveable chairs would be helpful.





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Phase 2 Community Engagement

Overview

Community engagement events for the second phase of the Thompson County Park Master Plan were held from the end of January through March 2019. The purpose of the events was to engage a representative cross section of Dakota County residents, park users, students, educators, and stakeholder organizations to collect meaningful input, build consensus, and generate interest for the park master planning process to assist in working towards a preferred master plan concept. The project team was especially mindful of reaching out to those who may live around the park but are not park users and considering feedback from the Dakota Sioux Indian Communities

As shown in the following table, there were over a dozen engagement activities and meetings. In addition to an online survey, events included pop-up events with materials in both English and Spanish, individual and agency meetings, stakeholder meetings, and meetings with student groups.

This appendix begins with a highlights section that summarizes the key themes heard from all of the engagement. The highlights are followed by the results of the Social Pinpoint online survey. The inperson events are then summarized. The events are grouped by type for reference with a table listing the events included in the subsection provided first.

Highlights

Overall, the community outreach indicates that Thompson County Park is well loved and that there are many items to consider when moving forward with a preferred concept. The setting, existing trail system, mixture of activities, and shelter/lodge rental bring a wide range of people to the park, and a lot of interest has been gained for each of the two concept options. Much of the feedback received indicated that Thompson's existing users are diverse, from young children, extended families, students, and a 55+ community that may have opposing input on proposed activities. Many wish to see the park remain as natural as possible, encouraging younger users to explore and enjoy the park's natural resources, while younger user groups expressed great interest in the activity centers and features like play areas or hammock groves. Much of the commentary expressed that individuals see a lot of value in increasing the park's potential for educational purposes.

Natural Resources

The concept of not only improving the park's already existing vast natural resources, but expanding them was sought after in our engagement activities. As much as potential users of this space crave new programming, they also feel the importance of finding a balance between having more activities and preserving natural resources. They commended the expansion of the Savanna, expressed their desires to keep the wooded areas as natural as possible, wanted better care for the park's lakes and ponds, and voiced approval for the idea of managing invasive species throughout the park. Wildlife viewing was expressed as one of the main reasons for visiting, and enhancing natural resources brought excitement for the possibility to expand animal habitat.

Core Habitat

Users of all age groups expressed interest in items they considered useful for viewing wildlife. The shore fishing areas, piers, observation tower, pollinator promenade, ravine bridge, and savanna restoration showcase were all listed as proposed features that would increase their chances of experiencing wildlife. The land bridge and savanna restoration areas were identified as great features to encourage ground nesting birds or habitat connections. Forward-thinking improvements to benefit the connection of nature in a city environment through the possibility of a land bridge and expanded savanna were commended.

More to do in the park

There was excitement generated around the idea of equipment rentals within Thompson park, especially among younger users and students. Popular ideas among users were hammocks, which are important to the Latino culture, not in a grove but spread throughout the park in multiple areas, and food trucks for extended stays. Play areas, gathering areas (picnic shelters), and the sledding hill were generally well-received by family user groups.

Gathering

Adding smaller shelters as well as additional picnic tables and grills for drop in use (and no reservation fee) was a popular idea. These facilities would support smaller group gatherings, spontaneous gatherings, and encourage people to spend more time in the park.

Dakota Lodge

There was expressed interest for having Dakota Lodge available for greater public purpose through expanded uses like park orientation, warming, public rest rooms and drinking fountains, facility rentals, and environmental classes or school use. Some comments mentioned that Dakota Lodge was difficult to rent during the day but would make a great space for classes and field trips. Features such as the entry plaza were highly desired to clarify lodge access and direction for visitors, but there was also reservation about that area having too much activity.

Interpretation and Educational Value

There is an overwhelming desire for Thompson Park to be highlighted for its beautiful natural resources and its potential contribution to science and education, a gap in the Twin Cities area that is currently not being offered by many (very little competition). Comments that the park would make a great 'outdoor lab' and be used for classes and clubs was a conversation that appeared often throughout the engagement process. The desire to have plant identification labels, multilingual educational signage, an indoor/outdoor classroom set-up, and better access to the lake and wetland for student use represents the desire of users to come to Thompson to enjoy its natural beauty and learn more about the surrounding environment. There was a lot of enthusiasm expressed for natural play and play in nature as something that is growing in popularity and will be a feature the differentiates Thompson from other parks. Features such as the savanna restoration, pollinator promenade, and the proposed daylighted water feature were generally very well received. The Dakota County Public Art Advisory Committee is interested in further exploring how public art can be integrated into interpretation in the park.

Cultural Significance

Meetings with members of the Sioux Indian Communities revealed the need to introduce the now absent Native American narrative. Interpretation should focus on recognizing that the park is part of Dakota Homeland (rather than focusing on a specific date or place). The most effective interpretation would connect native people to the landscape. Opportunities included art created by Native American artists, educational signage that interacts with history and science school curriculums introducing cultural significant native plants and potential developing programs/permits for harvesting, and fishing. The park was also encouraged to explore activities and amenities such as food trucks, music, colorfully designed spaces, and hammocking (an activity important to the Latino culture) to appeal to a more diverse audience of users.

Desire for Connection

Enthusiasm was generated through this process for better connection within the park and better access to the park. Many like the idea of expanding the use to the southern portions, highlighting the history of Simon's Ravine and inviting exploration with a combination of natural surface and paved trails that will serve many different user groups and abilities. Positive feedback was received regarding the enhanced connection to Kaposia Park, as well as a more defined connection to the River to River Greenway and proposed trailhead. The need for improved wayfinding to guide users within the park and to the park from the neighborhoods was stressed by many participants. Several people who do not drive (too young, are disabled, or do not have a car) mentioned difficulty getting to the park due to lack to transit service and the incomplete sidewalk and trail networks leading to the park.

Accessibility

Additional paved trails would make the southern portion of the park more accessible to more park visitors. Many of the exiting paved trails in the northern portion of the park, while meeting minimum ADA Standards, difficult for older adults and those with disabilities because of steep slopes. Trail access from Dakota Lodge to the playground and from the parking area to the North Shelter were specifically mentioned as locations where railings are needed. Making sure items like the fishing pier are safe and ADA accessible, while paved trails are important to visitors who have mobility challenges. Consensus that there is a large need for accessible playgrounds in WSP, as well as trail elements like benches with arms along the trails for resting. In addition, care when designing rest rooms, the addition of a comfort room to Dakota Lodge, and care when designing way finding to meet needs of people with cognitive disabilities was mentioned.

Parking

A vast amount of the input received centered around whether or not there was a need for expanded parking or if current parking would be able to provide for new programs and uses being proposed in the concepts. Many who provided input felt that current parking was sufficient when there wasn't an event of facility rental taking place at the park and are concerned about reducing natural resources for more paved space that may be underutilized. Other feedback stated that parking was a current issue and that additional uses would increase parking problems. Adding a road and parking in the

center of the park as shown in Concept B was a cause for concern for many regarding safety for users. However, others were interested in the proposed play areas in Concept B, thinking that it would add convenience for those uses and encourage further exploration of the southern part of the park. St. Croix is willing to collaborate on overflow parking for events, but only with the use of a shuttle system, which may help mitigate the issue.

Lighting and Safety

Another conversation surrounding the concepts was the need to enhance the feeling of safety and security within the park with the use of lighting. Many comments were received regarding concern for light pollution, while others would feel more comforted and encouraged to use the park in the evening with the addition of lighting along the paths. It was also suggested that lighting could help prevent the vandalism of items such as educational signs or hammock groves that are being proposed.

Facilities Management


Many comments and concerns about litter in the park, vandalism of proposed signs, existing issue with snow plowing areas or keeping trails clean appeared throughout a number of comments, as did the desire for trail and park amenities like restrooms, drinking fountains, and dog waste disposal stations.

Social Pinpoint


Social Pinpoint is an online engagement tool that provides multiple ways for users to share their thoughts about the park. For the second phase, the website used both the survey and the map-based comment tools to solicit input. In addition, at many events attendees had the opportunity to provide feedback in a similar manner as was requested on Social Pinpoint. To facilitate analysis and provide an opportunity for Social Pinpoint users to also see and respond to input provided at events, feedback from pop-up events and the open house was entered into Social Pinpoint. In total there were more than 400 visitors to the Social Pinpoint website. Visitors spent, on average, 8 minutes reviewing the site and providing input. Between Social Pinpoint users and event input entered onto the site, there were more than 360 comments. On the following pages is a summary of the input received.

Survey Results


Participants were able to take part in a short survey about their visits to Thompson County Park and their priorities regarding the two master plan concepts. Overall, park users seem to visit monthly and arrive by car and are primarily concerned about having comfortable amenities to use during their stay, having plenty of room for picnicking, good wayfinding, areas to use for education, and the opportunity to utilize equipment rentals. Many surveyed preferred Concept A to Concept B. Many were concerned about the amount of parking and new structures being proposed, while others were excited at how much more there would be to do in the park with either concept. The survey data shows that people love and hope to preserve as much of the natural resources as possible in Thompson County Park. A total of 75 surveys were completed during Phase 2. However, as not all surveys were complete, please be aware that the number of respondents for an individual question may vary.

Interactive Map Feature - Social Pinpoint


Participants were asked to place markers on an interactive map of Thompson Park under three difference categories: 'I Like This,' 'How about this new idea?' and 'This Concerns Me'.

- » 'I Like This' Participants expressed their preference for an item by placing a green marker on or near an item they would like to see in the preferred concept.
- » 'How About This New Idea?' Visitors placed a yellow marker in the areas of the park where they thought a new idea might be a good fit. This marker was also used to express an alternative idea to items that were being proposed.
- » 'This Concerns Me' Participants were able to express their reservations about a proposed idea with a grey marker on each concept.

The charts are organized by the color that each marker represents. Comments are organized by marker number. Comments followed by a set of parenthesis represent comments received at in-person engagement events that were entered into Social Pinpoint. The abbreviation within the parenthesis denotes the event at which that comment was documented. A list of the event abbreviations and their meaning can be seen below. It should be noted that for some locations only a dot was placed and no comment was received. These are noted by a description that just includes the event at which the dot was placed.

TPAC ADVISORY COMMITTEE COMMENTS | JANUARY 24TH, 2019

Discussion and Comments about Concepts A&B

Overall prefer Concept B.

Like the pollinator promenade. This would good for programs with school groups.

Any concept needs to have food and parking.

Really like the idea of food trucks. This supports bringing food to the park with minimal expense. Kids love to eat.

Do not favor the idea of adding extra buildings. These add operating costs and we want to encourage people to use the outside areas of the park.

Like the extra parking in Concept B. Today there is a parking problem when Dakota Lodge is rented during the day. Any improvements need to be accompanied by accommodating additional parking needs.

Love the connection to Kaposia shown in A, it really opens up so much more park. At minimum, better wayfinding is needed.

Like the Hammock grove, it appeals to middle and high school students. It is also flexible in that it is not a huge investment, so when the trend fades the space can easily be adapted for other uses.

Would like to see plant identification information, particularly for the trees. There are a lot of unusual trees in this park and many people cannot distinguish them. This could support a tree identification class.

Would like to have Dakota Park Center staffed. Would be great if this was a place that you could come and get a cup of coffee, similar to Lebanon Hills Visitor Center.

As long as we get to dream, let's think fun. Would like a zip line or a canopy walk.

There should be a mix of paved and unpaved trails ~ different types for different interests and needs. Many people who use the Adult 55+ program come to this park for even surfaces. Paved surfaces close to the Thompson Activity Center are important. Hard, even surface is more important than pavement.

Think about crisis management. This park has one entrance – how would we get in and out of the park in an emergency situation.

Things that would improve the park for Adults 55+:

- » Trail support facilities are essential: benches, drinking fountains, lighting, wayfinding, dog stations
- » If watercraft are provided, paddle pontoons are best for older adults.
- » An indoor outdoor classroom would be a great addition to Thompson Park Center. A place that has great views of the park, can be opened in summer and closed in winter. This could be used for classes and clubs.

ACCESSIBILITY AND INCLUSION MEETING | FEBRUARY 11TH, 2019

A mix of paved trails and natural surface trails is best

The entrance to Dakota Lodge needs better lighting and a better waiting area, Metro Mobility cannot find the door

Simple wayfinding signage that works on multiple levels would be very helpful. Symbol, color, identification marker

The natural areas are what make this park special. The balance is providing accessibility without degrading the natural areas

The sensory garden is a nice idea. It would be great to have not only sensory friendly destinations with in the park but also mobile sensory kits available at Dakota Lodge. It could be a backpack with noise canceling headphones; the Dakota County Libraries have them.

Any picnic facilities need to have adequate trash cans, as there is a lot of litter in Thompson Park.

Making the fishing pier more accessible is desired.

Opening Dakota Lodge to more public use is very important to making the park more accessible. People living with disabilities need a climate controlled place to relax and 'take a breather'. This can be a shared space for everyone.

Educating caregivers about the park's amenities would bring more people to the park. Care givers would then bring family members or clients to the park.

Virtual park tours, or social stories on the website are a good way to let people know what to expect from their park visit. By showing people what is in the southern part of the park, it would encourage use.

STAKEHOLDER MEETING | FEBRUARY 1ST, 2019

Discussion and Comments about Concepts A&B

What works well - GENERAL

Ecological health/natural resource based recreation. This is unique and is not provided by the cities.

The nature play areas are important and something that differentiates the park from play in many city parks.

The County's nature education is really filling a service gap that the cities do not do much of. If the cities and County can partner for these programs in the northern part of the County, there is synergy, not competition.

Both concepts have a true connection to the River to River trail; this is needed The use area south of Dakota Lodge encourages exploration of the entire park.

Lighting along the lake trail loop is a priority; this would be used by students.

Adding non-reservation picnic shelters is needed. The park needs more grills.

Like that there are more places for small group gathering.

Improving the park entrance at Butler would make a big impact as far as park visibility and awareness.

There are opportunities for the Y to complement its indoor programming with bringing people to public parks. Some areas for potential partnership include fishing, kayaking, canoeing.

Mobile camps that can 'pop-up' in a park are an opportunity for partnership.

If Dakota Lodge was staffed, there may be more participation of grade schools in the park.

What works well - CONCEPT A

The inclusive playground and the sensory garden in Concept A.

Love the sledding hill and the fire pit.

Kids will like the ravine bridge.

What works well - CONCEPT B

The observation tower.

Love the sledding hill and the fire pit.

Concept B seems like it is most effective as far as getting people into the natural areas in the park.

Like the idea of locating the trailhead away from the main building in Concept B. There is already a lot going on in the building.

Love the pollinator garden.

What DOES NOT work well - General

The pier shown on the west side of the lake should be moved to the flat area on the southwest side of the lake.

There is concern about vandalism particularly tagging on the retaining wall on the west side of the lake. Better lighting would dissuade undesirable behavior.

What DOES NOT work well - Concept A

The water feature in Concept A. Dakota lodge is a busy area and adding a water feature would add complexity. A water feature/water play would be better closer to the picnic shelters.

What DOES NOT work well - Concept B

In Concept B, the use area in the middle of the park may attract late night activity because it is secluded. If it is built, a gate should be added to control access. Kaposia Park has a gate that is locked at night and this works well.

The waterway between Thompson Lake and Emerson Pond is an attractive feature, but may not be worth the expense. It may not be the highest priority if it is costly.

Hammocking is very popular but would be more desirable if the locations were throughout the park instead of concentrated in one place.

There are currently issues in the park with snow plowing. When the road is plowed snow blocks the north parking lot entrance. If a new access road is built from Dakota Lodge to the use area proposed in Concept B, snow clearing will have to be fine-tuned to make sure the road access remains plowed.

St. Croix Lutheran Students enter the park though the south end of the lake.

A playground is needed. Be careful not to go without.

Would want the park's role as a trailhead to be in addition to trailheads at Kaposia Park (existing), and Marthaler Park (proposed).

Adding more equipment means it is importance to have a maintenance facility in the park for storage.

When the weather is cold, there are sometimes homeless people warming up in the bathrooms.

The lower field area gets a lot of runoff. It can be very wet, especially as the snow melts.

There are opportunities to cross promote between entities: Community Education, Dakota County, Businesses, and Cities. This could bring nature based experiences to new groups.

Using the theme of Health can be powerful. Many people and organizations have the common goal of health and wellness and are wanting to access healthy activities.

TC MP - DAKOTA COUNTY PUBLIC ART MEETING | FEBRUARY 12TH, 2019

Discussion and Comments about Concepts A&B

Discussion

Seemed to be some consensus on preference for Concept B as it provided greater accessibility to the entire park. Comments about it being more family friendly with closer proximity to parking and park features. Also, southern access provided an opportunity to "push on" with "still more to discover"

Committee felt that the interpretive themes and subthemes made sense. The interpretive themes/subthemes is a great place to think about art and how it can amplify spaces, places and communities.

Liked the access and connections to the lake in the concepts. They might encourage people to get their feet wet.

The committee also liked the idea of bike share and kayak share in the park.

The committee discussed having games or destinations to draw visitors to the southern portion of the park. They mentioned MagiQuest in the Wisconsin Dells, magic wand with special powers that sets you off on a special quest.

Orientation / Wayfinding / Interpretation / Art – consider bilingual opportunities (e.g., translation dictionary - teach kids new words in different languages)

Citizen Science – look for opportunities to work with St Croix Lutheran, other schools and public on citizen science projects. They mentioned a good example is St Thomas Academy partnership with Mendota Heights regarding Rogers Lake.

Public Art

Consider involving the voices of Native artists to create conversations and build bridges (committee member mentioned the This American Life story on Henry Sibley)

There is an opportunity to incorporate public art in the form of found objects art or restoration art from materials removed from the lake in clean-up efforts. Since the lake clean-up occurs once or twice/year, this could be an opportunity

The committee suggested tying art to environmental awareness. There was a suggestion for a type of sculpture that might look different depending on the season/ that it changes on its own may even have bird's nests and art links to water themes or resources.

The committee suggested working together as part of the DC Public Art 2020 work plan to designate public art project to coincide with CIP project improvements

The committee mentioned art apps that show locations of public art in the metro area. Locating a piece in Thompson could bring new visitors to the park.

Dakota Lodge

There was interest in Dakota Lodge being available for greater public purpose and use particularly or for restrooms, drinking water, warmth, shade and maps/orientation. However, some commented on how affordable, nice and well-kept a facility it is and didn't want that jeopardized.

If a sledding hill is nearby, consider opening Dakota Lodge as a winter warming space. Also consider recreation equipment rentals (sleds, snowshoes, watercraft)

Other

Who is Simon of Simon's Ravine?

Reference Harmon Park in WSP as a place that provides some warming and restrooms to park visitors without completing opening up the building

The Public Art Advisory Committee is planning an event in Thompson Park August 4, 2019. It would be wonderful if there would be a booth related to the master plan at that event.

LOWER SIOUX MEETING | MARCH 4TH, 2019

Discussion and Comments

Telling Dakota Stories in Thompson County Park is important. There is no reason to limit the Dakota story to specific places when all of the county (and beyond) is Dakota homeland.

» There is a collection of parks in metro area that are incorporating interpretation. It would be helpful to know what is being done in each of these parks so that locations tell unique stories.

It is more important to focus on indigenous knowledge and traditional ecological knowledge rather than a 'timeline' history.

» Emphasis on making a landscape connection is important. For example, a traditional garden with sunflowers, 3 sisters mound gardens, discussing star knowledge.

There is an opportunity to talk about broad issues through the Dakota lens as a way to be relevant to more people.

- » A theme that can have meaning and appeal for all people is Mitakuye Oyasin (we are all related). This could be a framework for discussing climate change, for example.
- » Lower Mounds Park/Lower Phalen Creek in St. Paul has adopted the theme 'Many Paths'. This idea includes indigenous people and also recent immigrants, for example Somali.

The Lower Sioux Indian Community has resources that can be used to develop interpretation.

- » Elder interviews that talk about community history, gardening, star knowledge.
- » The Lower Sioux Plant Guide and App is a guide to native plants, names, pronunciation, and meaning. This is a great resource for introducing native plants.

If the tower idea moves forward, be sure to consider view shed impacts from Kaposia Village – would the tower be visible from the Mississippi River?

Consider public art. Public art is at the forefront of great interpretation. For example, Bde Maka Ska, conducted a call for artists. The interpretive elements include prints on the sidewalk and technology, Mona Smith was the artist. Marlena Milos is another Native American artist.

The Twin Cities urban Indian groups that are pretty active who can provide input on projects.

UPPER SIOUX INDIAN COMMUNITY MEETING | MARCH 4TH, 2019

Discussion and Comments

Telling Dakota Stories in Thompson County Park is important. The approach is that the Dakota were not in specific area at a specific time but that the whole area was home to indigenous people.

Sacred site tours in the metro area lack a Dakota presence. The presence of non-native people can be seen everywhere ~ in buildings, cars, roads etc.

Native Americans were stewards of the land and natural areas helped with ecological balance.

There is a huge native population in the cities. If Dakota County wants input from Native Americans, the Upper Sioux can help connect to native people in the Twin Cities.

It is important to provide private areas for offering prayers.

St. Paul has established and advisory Group for Mounds Park

Discussion and Comments

Dakota County Staff provided an overview progress on the Thompson County Park Master Plan and Natural Resource Management Plan.

Michael Leek is the main contact for requests for input on Dakota County interpretive projects. All requests/notifications can be emailed to him and he will distribute to the appropriate staff. This is intended to result a timely response from the community.

If input beyond staff is desired there are several citizen work groups that hold monthly meetings. For example there is a cultural affairs work group, it would be possible to get on their agenda.

PRAIRIE ISLAND INDIAN COMMUNITY MEETING | APRIL 25TH, 2019

Discussion and Comments

Acknowledging the historic broad Dakota Sioux occupation in Minnesota would be beneficial in Thompson County Park. The approach is not to pinpoint Dakota occupation to a specific time and place but recognize Thompson County Park is part of the larger Dakota Homeland.

Finding ways to connect urban Dakota people to the landscape and make it relevant for today (instead of something in the past) is a challenge. Native plants are way to do this. Nikki Buck is a great resource for information on traditional foods and native plant harvesting.

Signage can be expanded upon with technology/apps.

Fort Snelling has a project currently underway – the main contact is Johnathan with the National Park Service.

Make sure the minority voices are heard and not absent from the park.

City of Red Wing is doing interesting work incorporating memory maps. Kate Ferris (?) is the THPO for the Red Lake Ojibwe has been working with GIS and memory mapping.

Prairie Island has an Archeological Dataset. It would be interesting to see how that compares to what Dakota County knows about Thompson County Park.

Lighting and Safety

The students use the lake trail frequently; lighting for safety is needed. The bollard lighting shown as examples likely wouldn't be bright enough to increase visibility from a distance. Think about lighting for safety, not only facility use.

The whole northwest portion of the lake is scariest for students. Lighting in this area would improve safety.

Lighting near the playground is needed.

Visibility from the school to the west side of the lake is poor. The second pier and shore fishing opportunities should be moved to the southwest side of the lake, where there is better visibility and a larger flat area.

Lake Access

The southwest lake shore would be a good location for canoe/kayak storage, lake access, a storage shed, fishing pier, and shore fishing.

There are opportunities for St. Croix Lutheran and County to partner on providing canoes and kayaks. The school would be interested in getting kids on the lake for physical education classes and science classes. School use would be during the school day in the spring and fall - times that are lower demand for public use.

There are opportunities to partner on fishing programs.

Dakota Lodge/Rental Space

Dakota Lodge is difficult to rent as it is often booked during the day. The school would like to rent it for staff meetings/ retreats. A room that accommodates about 30 people with a kitchenette is desirable. A building with restrooms, a kitchenette, and meeting space would be great near the sledding hill. The existing parking lot could be used.

Schaar's Bluff Gathering Center is a good size. The Gathering Center restroom design works well. People using the park and those renting the room can share without conflicts.

St. Croix Lutheran is open to collaborating to share parking for special events, particularly if people can be shuttled between the lot and the park. Because of the dormitory location, it is not possible to have the general public walking between the school lot and the park. Student safety is the first priority.

More to do in the park

The day-lighted water flow between Thompson Lake and Emmerson Pond is a really nice feature. It would open up a lot of opportunities for ecology /science education. The park makes a great outdoor lab.

Inviting more use of the southern part of the park is a good thing. Simon's Ravine is one of the nicest parts of the park and most people have no idea it is there.

The sledding hill presented in both concepts is a good idea.

More to do in the park

Interpretive signage throughout the park highlighting natural resources and the park's farming history are a good idea. Tree identification is also desired.

Multi-lingual signage, at minimum in Spanish and English, but even 4-5 core languages could be the standard within the park.

Community engagement

Consider reaching out to Heritage Middle School for input.

There is interest in hosting an open house for students to provide input on the park concepts at the school. Lil Leatham will follow up with Rick Gibson to schedule.

The story map Dakota County put together for the lake restoration project is really interesting and well done.

HERITAGE MIDDLE SCHOOL STAFF MEETING | FEBRUARY 28TH, 2019

Discussion and Comments about Concepts A&B

As part of the 6th grade science curriculum, there is currently a field trip to Highland Park in Bloomington where the kids participate in canoeing, archery, rock climbing, geocaching, and Native American games. If Thompson County Park offered this type of program, it would be preferable to go to a park within the community. Even though Heritage E-Stem is less than 2 miles from the park, kids would need to be bussed.

Paved trails are really important for allowing kids with limiting physical conditions to participate in activities

A location for bus drop off and gathering is also important

Heritage-Stem partners with Dodge Nature Center for 5th and 7th grade science; Dodge staff does come to the school 2-3 times a week. They do not partner for 6th and 8th grade science, so there could be an opportunity to partner with Dakota County in these grade levels

Programs that align with curriculum include pond studies, prairie restoration, tree studies, air quality, orienteering, honey bees.

There are opportunities from for the Physical Education Department to bring the kids to the park for outdoor recreation

The park would benefit from bilingual signs

New Middle School Science Curriculum includes climate change and a native American component at all grade levels. Interpretive elements in the park that further understanding in these areas would support /reinforce what students are learning in school.

A virtual tour of the park would increase awareness

One meeting participant offered that as a resident, she is not in favor of the parking lot south of the Dakota Lodge shown in Concept B

All students have iPads. If there are ways that they could interact with the park ~ for example in a water quality study it would add to their experience

The park could be a demonstration site for clean energy/demonstration. The park already has some of these elements such as the electric vehicle (EV) charging station and the compost drop off. City of West St. Paul is moving towards 100% clean electric; Hy-Vee has small wind turbines at their stores.

Upcoming opportunities for general parks outreach are West St. Paul Arbor Day and Marine Team Day

Improvement Preferences – Full Group Prioritization Results

At the end of the meeting, the full group discussed and participated in an exercise to prioritize the favorite ideas. The favored ideas, in order of priority were:

- 1) Day lighted Stream and trail lighting (tie)
- 2) Food trucks (suggested Tacos and Hamburgers)
- 3) Equipment rentals and hammocks (tie)

Suggestions/Discussion

Students were most interested in features that make the park unique and cannot be found in other nearby parks

Hammocks - this is important to Latino culture, many Latinos have hammocks in their houses traditionally. To promote diversity, hammocks are a good idea, questions about whether there would be hammocks for rent or if you would need to bring your own, if they were for rent, how they would be kept clean. Student like the idea of small pods of hammocks (2-3 per location) rather than in a grove.

Park activities they like include: swings, see-saws, flowers to take pictures (senior pictures, dances, etc.) tennis, volleyball (could be net).

They find out information from their parents so the school could be a good way to contact them, professor suggested the district newsletter suggested using Instagram and SnapChat to promote the parks.

Many felt that trails in nature/natural resource restoration would not be engaging. Suggested having changing scavenger hunts in the park and or sculptures in the natural areas for views/interest.

Many students are safety conscious - particularly in terms of nature play, sand, rocks, wading in water.

There was a lot of enthusiasm for equipment rentals -canoes, kayaks, volleyball, skateboards, bikes, ice skates.

Suggested adding bike lanes to trail network (or enough space for bicycling).

Suggested adding hopscotch for kids on the sidewalk .

Suggested adding colorful features to attract people to the park.

Suggested to add lighted information boxes with announcements, open area for sports, rentals for small scale soccer, sledding hill.





Phase 3 Community Engagement

Overview

Community engagement events for the third phase of the Thompson County Park Master Plan were held from the end of August through early December 2019. The purpose of the 3rd phase of the community engagement process was to solicit input on the ten-year and long-term draft master plans, as well as collect feedback on the Natural Resources Management Plan for Thompson County Park. There were over a dozen community outreach events to collect input from a wide variety of sources. Phase 3 included outreach to students, families, youth, service men and women, inclusive groups, and stakeholders by means of meetings, events, open houses with bilingual materials, and an online survey.

Discussion and questions focused on surveying the strength of the concepts and how well they aligned with the needs and priorities of current and potential park users. What concerns, if any, did respondents have with the draft plans? Which proposed improvements should be made a high priority for implementation? Are there any ideas that are not currently included in the draft master plan that the public feels should be considered for Thompson?
