Winter - Spring 2024: Final Plan and Approvals


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NRMP Highlights



- · Restore the entire park in 35 years
- · Maintain all restored areas into the future
- Restore Trout Brook, starting with the upper reaches
- Provide a diverse and rich habitat for native wildlife
- Foster a resilient ecosystem
- Collaborate and partner with adjacent landowners
- Achieve regionally outstanding ecological quality

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Cultural Landscape Recommendations Dakota

- All park improvements will occur with further cultural and environmental study, Tribal consultation, and monitoring.
- Work with representatives of associated Indigenous tribes and nations, the Minnesota Office of the State Archaeologist (OSA), and the Minnesota Indian Affairs Council (MIAC) for additional understanding.
- Consult with THPOs as part of developing scopes of work and making decisions about maintenance and management of the landscape

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Public Review - NRMP



Across all engagement activities support for natural resources, habitat, and wildlife.

What are your top natural resources improvement priorities that would increase your use and enjoyment of Miesville Ravine Park Reserve?

Habitat restoration	52% (16)
Trout Brook restoration	52% (16)
Improved wildlife viewing (by removal of invasive vegetation)	48% (15)
Other	32% (10)

Public Review – Long-range Plan Dukota On-Line Questionnaire Priorities What are your top recreation improvement priorities that would increase your use and enjoyment of Miesville Ravine Park Reserve? Safer Cannon River non-motorized boat/tube drop off and river access 22% (7) Narrow, natural surface walking/hiking trails that explore more areas of the park with 50% (16) Accessible hiking/walking trails loop near the Cannon River 31% (10) ADA-accessible Cannon River boat launch and river access 6% (2) Picnic area improvements 13% (4) Other 75% (24) Of those that checked other, mountain biking was most requested (16)

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Public Review- Long-range Plan



Mountain biking is not being recommended at this time to protect the natural and cultural landscape

- Steeply sloped areas with fragile soils that are highly sensitive to erosion
- Minimize potential soil erosion flowing into Trout Brook
- Ravine slopes contain plant communities designated by the State of Minnesota as Vulnerable and Imperiled
- Minimize impact to Indigenous Traditional Cultural Places (TCP)


Wayfinding
